Waldo Mill Ready to Operate—The installation of the concentrating plant upon the Waldo copper mine is about completed, and the plant will commence running the early part of the present week. The concentrator is of 50-ton daily capacity, and will commence operations upon the large amount of ore held in the dumps after the higher grade had been hauled to Waters Creek for shipment to the smelter. The concentrator will reduce the ore to about one-sixth its usual bulk, the concentrates to be hauled out to the railroad.
