IRISH QUESTION NEAR SOLUTION

London, Dec. 16.—The long delayed settlement of the Irish question is now visible. An amiable union of the Ulsterites and the southern Irishmen was nearer today than it ever has been since the futile passage of the home rule bill in 1914.

Lloyd-George's negotiations, following the Dublin revolution, which outwardly were a failure, nevertheless, have been steadily and quietly progressing. They have now reached a stage where a definite favorable announcement may be expected at any day.

One of the things most noted in comment upon the personnel of the new cabinet, was that there was no serious objection raised to Sir Edward Carson's appointment—as there was when Sir Edward was first included in Asquith's coalition cabinet. Nor was there any criticism over Lloyd-George's retaining of Henry Edward Duke as chief secretary for Ireland in the cabinet. Obviously the premier's action was on account of Duke's efforts to reunite Ireland.

Major Redmond's appeal in commons yesterday, in which he cited the fact that Ulster men and Nationalists were the most amiable of companions on the western front, was the first open indication of impending events.
