LIST AMERICANS NOW IN GERMANY

Berlin, Feb. 17.—The American government is listing all its citizens in Germany. The move is one to facilitate the exodus of such citizens in the event of war between Germany and America. The active government agency is the Spanish ambassador who, since the departure of Ambassador Gerard, represents United States' interests. In close co-operation with the gathering of names and addresses, are the American chamber of commerce and the United Press.

KENNETT MAN KILLS INVADER OF HOME

Kennett, Cal., Feb. 17.—William Herniman, aged 48, was shot and killed by Claude Reppert, 43, today, when the former appeared at Reppert's home to call on Mrs. Reppert. The slayer notified the authorities of the tragedy and asserted that his victim had tried to break up his home by persuading Mrs. Reppert to elope today.

Mrs. Reppert confirmed this statement.

The tragedy occurred in front of the Reppert home. Suspecting Herniman, Reppert remained at home today instead of going to work as usual. He was waiting when Herniman appeared. Reppert drew a revolver and fired one shot. The bullet entered the back of Herniman's head and passed entirely through it. Herniman fell dead.
