CHEMISTS ENROLL FOR INVESTIGATION SERVICE

Eugene, May 1.—How thoroughly the federal authorities at Washington appreciate the fact that this is to be a war of co-ordinated man power rather than simply an army and navy contest, is indicated by the survey being made of the supply of scientific investigators available for research work. The government in-

tends setting the best brains of the country at work on problems of industrial development, the employment of scientific methods in strengthening the national defense and any other application of science as will promote national security and welfare.

Professors O. F. Stafford and F. J. Shinn of the chemistry department of Oregon university have enrolled in this census, and if called

into active service, will work under the direction of the natural research council organized at the request of President Wilson.

NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS (Sewer)

Notice is hereby given to each and every owner or the owners of the hereinafter described lots and blocks and acreage property as more fully appears set out in full in the attached and annexed Apportioned Assessment Roll, which is incorporated in and made a part of this notice, marked Exhibit "A." That the Common Council, pursuant to the petition of the property owners praying that there be constructed a six inch lateral sewer commencing at the point where the alley through block 17, Original Townsite, intersects Eighth street, and thence by an easterly course along the center of the alley of block 18, to a point at or near Skunk creek at or near the southwesterly corner of lot 3, in block 2, and thence northerly extending across lot 2 of said block and along the west boundary line of block 1, to the northwest corner of lot 3, in said block 1, and thence easterly to the south end of the dividing line between lots 1 and 2, in said block 1, has caused the City Surveyor to prepare plans, specifications, profiles and drawings and quantities necessary and suitable for such proposed work, all of which has been approved and adopted. That subsequently Ordinance No. 758 was duly ordained providing for the construction of said sewer, and thereupon the sewer committee of said Common Council was directed to view out, inspect and examine each lot, part of lot or acreage property and ascertain the benefit and extent that would accrue by such improvements and the character, nature and probable cost of such work, and thereupon return to the Common Council findings and an Apportioned Assessment Roll based upon the probable cost, with the description of the property benefited.

That on the 19th day of April, A. D. 1917, said sewer committee, after having performed its labors, returned to the Common Council an Apportioned Assessment Roll, and its findings, all of which now remain on file with the auditor and police judge and will thus remain until the time of hearing provided and set aside by the Common Council in notice to property owners.

That the estimated probable cost of said six inch lateral sewer amounts to the sum of \$202.00 and is distributed among the following items of quantities, viz.: 650 linear feet of six inch concrete pipe; 98 cubic yards of excavation.

That said sewer committee finds that each and every one of the lots, blocks or acreage property described in said assessment roll is peculiarly and directly benefited to the extent and portion as designated by the amount set opposite each description and that such parcel of land should bear such proportion of the

estimated probable cost. That any person or persons interested in such proposed improvements may at any time inspect and examine the findings and returns of said sewer committee. That written objections, protests or remonstrances may be filed against such contemplated improvement in writing within six days after final publication of this notice by posting, which publication by posting will end on the 5th day of May, A. D. 1917. That thereafter at the next regular meeting of the Common Council on the 17th day of May, A. D. 1917, all written objections or remonstrances thus filed with the auditor and police judge, and within the time and manner required by law, will be considered and heard in open council, and thereupon the said Common Council after such hearing, if any there be, will consider and determine the said sewer committee's report and findings, and will thereupon make any modifications that may be deemed necessary and equitable, and when all modifications or revisions have been made, said Council will proceed to adopt the written report and findings of said sewer committee, and will thereupon order an ordinance drawn providing in the usual manner and time for the entry of the Assessment Roll in the Docket of City Liens, and will otherwise provide in such ordinance for the conclusion of such work, letting of the contract to the lowest responsible bidder, with the right reserved to reject any and all bids.

Plans, specifications, profiles with drawings and estimates of quantities may be found at the office of the city surveyor at the City Hall, and all ordinances and records are in the care and custody of the auditor and police judge, whose office is in the City Hall, on Fourth street.

RAILROADS TO ASK ADVANCE IN RATES

Portland, May 1.—A general advance of 15 per cent on inter-state freight rates in keeping with the increase in inter-state rates recently authorized by the inter-state commerce commission, will be sought by railroads operating in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, it became known here today.

The carriers have not completed their plans for the new state rates, but it is proposed to go to the commissions in the four northwest states and ask for the advance, effective July 1, without a hearing.

It is proposed then to conduct a series of investigations on both class and commodity rates to determine whether any business or industry will suffer under the new schedule. If this is true in any case readjustments are expected.
