ROOSEVELT'S FIGHT IS NOT ENDED YET

Washington, May 11.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's fight to lead an American force to France, is going right on. Unfavorable report by house and senate conferees on the Roosevelt division amendment of the army bill will be answered by republican senators on the floor. These men plan to fight for its re-incorporation in the selective draft measure.

At the same time friends of the colonel in the house are prepared to launch a new effort there in behalf of his volunteer division. Owing to the pressure being exerted on congress for action on the army bill, it is believed the fight for the colonel will not endure long, unless it is quickly won. The administration does not approve the plan and many democrats who previously voted for the measure are expected by democratic leaders to follow the wishes of the government.

Meantime the subject of the Roosevelt division was enlivened today by publication of correspondence between Roosevelt and Joseph Leiter, president of the Army League of the United States. Roosevelt resigned as honorary vice-president of the league and in his letter said: "Indeed, so far as the opposition (to the Roosevelt amendment) is not due to mere puzzle-headedness; it can only be due to politics, and politics of a very unwise and improper kind."

ITALY STARTS A NEW OFFENSIVE

Rome, May 11.—Indications that Italy may have started a general offensive movement, with Trieste as the objective, were contained in dispatches received via Switzerland today. They indicated a sudden resumption of intense fighting in this theater of the war, which has been almost quiescent for five or six months.

FRENCH PAY TRIBUTE TO FLYING SQUADRON

With the LaFayette Air Squadron, French Army, somewhere in France, May 11.—France proposes to show her appreciation of American flying squadron's work by giving it the finest equipment of any similar corps in the French army. It was learned here today that LaFayette Escadrille is shortly to be re-outfitted with new French war planes, which are the highest powered and the fastest yet invented. It is a graceful expression of the French tribute that the American flyers are the equal of any similar aerial force in the French army—and that means in the whole world.

The LaFayette Escadrille will be glad to get the new machines—but they would be happier if they could get American uniforms. Not one of the members has yet been able to ascertain what sort of a uniform an American aviator is supposed to wear. Because of this the corps is still clothed in the clothes issued by the French quartermasters department.

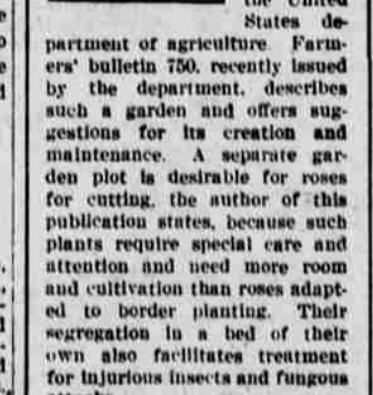


ROSES

Plant a Separate Bed For Cut Flower Roses.

Prepared by the U. S. department of agriculture

ROSE lovers who heretofore have confined their attention to general purpose roses, cutting their house flowers from plants used for lawn or border ornamentation or for covers for arbors, should find it desirable to plant a special rose garden for cut flowers. This is practically the only plan that will result in the production of blossoms of the highest quality, according to rose specialists of the United States department of agriculture. Farmers' bulletin 750, recently issued by the department, describes such a garden and offers suggestions for its creation and maintenance. A separate garden plot is desirable for roses for cutting, the author of this publication states, because such plants require special care and attention and need more room and cultivation than roses adapted to border planting. Their segregation in a bed of their own also facilitates treatment for injurious insects and fungous attacks.



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
