partment of agriculture Farmers' bulletin 750, recently issued the department, describes such a garden and offers suggestions for its creation and maintenance. A separate garden plot is desirable for roses for cutting, the author of this publication states, because such plants require special care and attention and need more room and cultivation than roses adapted to border planting. Their segregation in a bed of their own also facilitates treatment for injurious insects and fungous attacks.
