## RED CROSS MEMBERSHIP IS GAINING STEADILY

The membership committee of the Red Cross held an important meeting yesterday at the Chamber of Commerce. The work of canvassing the city was reported upon and plans for continuing the same, perfected.

A total paid membership to date of 114 was reported. Very little opposition to the work is encountered but on the other hand there is found much interest in the formation of classes and the beginning of actual work of preparing hospital supplies and first aid kits for the men at the front. This work will be undertaken at once.
