BE AMERICAN

To the everlasting shame of this nation, let it be said that subscriptions to the Liberty loan are dragging in a most discouraging way. Entering upon a war that may cost this country \$30,000,000,000 of money before we see it through, we are finding the raising of \$2,000,000,000 like pulling teeth.

What is a liberty bond? It is an obligation of the United States of America—your own country—the highest grade of security in the world always the favored investment of the wealthy, now issued in small denominations and available on equal terms to all.

Interest is paid twice a year, on December 15th and June 15th, at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent per annum.

It is exchangeable, without additional payment, for any bonds bearing a higher rate of interest that may be issued by the government before the termination of the war.

The principal is payable in 30 years—June 15, 1947—redeemable after 15 years at par and accrued interest, at option of government.

It is free from all federal, state and local taxes, both as to principal and interest, except inheritance taxes.

These bonds may be purchased in denominations of: Coupon bonds, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000. Registered bonds, \$100, \$500, \$1,000, \$10,000, \$50,000 and \$100,000.

Before this war is over it will be as much a patriotic duty of every stay-at-home to be the possessor of at least one of these bonds as it is the duty today of every young man between 21 and 30 years of age to be the possessor of one of the little green cards showing that he has registered for war service.

Buy a bond. Do it now. Do it because it is your patriotic duty.

forced to remain in idleness and that such a policy is the cause of 75 per cent of the lack of reformation and sickness of which prisons are chargeable.

The country is crying aloud for farm labor. Work in the open is healthful, it is reformative, it is badly needed.

The experiments so far made with convict labor, when it is not let out to contractors, has been decidedly satisfactory. It has helped both the prisoners and the community. How much more in need of such a policy now.

There is also the matter of cost of maintaining these prisoners. As the matter now stands, they are a tax on the production of the state when they should be an aid in that production.

Put the prisoners at some healthful, helpful out-door work.

CHILI INCREASES
ITS COPPER OUTPUT

Washington, June 5.—Government statistics just issued show that the total output of the copper mines of Chili, during 1916, was 20,000 tons greater than during the preceding year. The exports during 1916 were 114,000 tons.

In 1916 the exports of copper were 121,000 tons.

This is the highest figure ever attained by the copper industry of Chili and it is probable that the output for 1917 will show a similar increase over that of 1916. It is very evident that under existing conditions the production of copper in Chili will be very materially increased for some considerable time to come.

BREAK IN FISH LAKE
DAM HITS IRRIGATION

Medford, Ore., June 6.—A good sized leak in the Fish lake dam threatens to seriously interfere with irrigation in the valley this summer.

The canal company has rushed a large crew of men to the scene of the break, hoping to stop it before the stored up water of Fish lake runs to waste.

Considerable apprehension has been felt here as to the city water supply, but it is thought there is no immediate danger. Residents of Medford are forbidden to use water for other than domestic purposes.

City Engineer Arnsperger telephoned from the intake last night that considerable damage had been done, debris had been washed into the water above the city pipe line and it would probably be several days before normal conditions would return, but that he believed that no serious injury would result.

ENGLAND IS TRYING
HONOR FOOD CONTROL

London, June 6.—By the end of this month it will be possible to say whether the British stomach has a sense of humor. Said stomach has been on probation now for several weeks. RAILROAD SERVICE
MAINTAINED AS USUAL

San Francisco, June 5.—No serious inconvenience will be occasioned the public by the re-adjustment of the railroad service to meet the needs of the government. This assurance was telegraphed from New York by Julius Kruttschnitt, chairman of the executive committee of the Southern Pacific company and member of the "Railroad War Board."

The message will serve to allay apprehension of the general public that passenger service will be radically curtailed.

The meeting of traffic men in Chicago June 5, is for the purpose of considering only the elimination of such service as constitutes duplication or unnecessary facilities.

Y.M.C.A. CAMPAIGN
GETTING RESULTS

The campaign being waged for the army Y. M. C. A. fund is getting good results. Latest reports from national headquarters show \$2,705,988 subscribed by 34 states: Michigan \$120,000, Indiana \$97,791, Texas, \$59,700, Wisconsin \$48,000, Ohio \$224,000, New York \$783,915, California \$60,000.

The subscriptions reported in Oregon up to Monday, June 4, amount to a total of \$55,121, of which \$18,078 was subscribed in Portland.

Of the southern Oregon cities, the subscriptions are Ashland, \$520; Central Point, \$300; Grants Pass, \$702; Medford, \$600; Roseburg, \$665; Eagle Point, \$70; Jacksonville, \$70; Myrtle Creek, \$76.

Among the other Oregon cities are noted: Albany, \$932; Astoria, \$1,153; Baker, \$1,016; Bend, \$450; Corvallis, \$1,000; Dallas, \$409; Eugene, \$1,242; Forest Grove, \$610; Hood River, \$463; La Grande, \$600; Salem, \$1,549; Hillsboro, \$48; Marshfield, \$42; Woodburn, \$88.

PEOPLE OF BRAZIL
STRONG FOR ALLIES

Rio de Janeiro, May. (By mail) —It is doubtful whether any president of Brazil has been accorded the degree of popular approval that has been manifested toward Wenceslau Braz in the breaking of diplomatic relations and the probabilities of war with Germany. Newspapers print daily lists of telegrams offering support to the government. Flags of Brazil, the United States and the allies are displayed at patriotic meetings. Practically every Brazilian is taking his weekly drill on a rifle range. Mass for early success of the allies is sung in practically every Catholic church in the country.

NORTHWEST MILLS
RUSHED WITH ORDERS

Tacoma, Wash., June 6.—Orders for the immediate manufacture and delivery of 36,000,000 feet of lumber are in the hands of northwest mills today for the big camp at American Lake, where 60,000 men from Idaho, Washington and Oregon will train for service in the trenches. The Northern Pacific is mobilizing 3,000 men who will put in switches, spurs and sidings at the big camp. The railroad estimates that it will spend \$250,000 in these improvements. It is estimated that between 5,000 and 8,000 men will be required to construct the cantonments and army post depots. Immediate construction is planned, so that the camp will be ready when the first 500,000 men are drafted into service. American Lake is the divisional training port for the northwestern states.

MEET AT PITTSBURG

Pittsburg, Pa., June 6.—More than 3,500 strong, the delegates to the 44th annual convention of the National Conference of Charities and Corrections came to order at the rap of President Frederick Almy's gavel at the William Penn hotel today.

For six days they will wrestle with big questions of social welfare. These include birth control, prison reform, eugenics, child welfare, trade union labor legislation, the rural community's sociological problems and many other matters connected with the general subject of charities and corrections.

While the principal organization is in session, delegates representing various assemblies more or less allied will be attending several minor conventions, including that of the International Association of Police-women.

FRANCE HAS CALLED
YOUNGEST RECRUITS

With the French Armies, June 6. —France has begun training the class of 1918 consisting of the youngest recruits, by whose side America's army will be fighting next fall, should the war last that long.

The new French class will be younger than the men of the American army. They will be but 19, while the youngest Americans will be 21. All France hopes that American intervention will render it unnecessary to ever again call out one of the French classes before the usual military age. The class of 1918 which is now at the instruction camps is probably one of the finest France has produced. It is being especially instructed in bayonet fighting and hand-grenading.
