MEDFORD PULLS UP GOOD ROADS VOTE

The votes in Jackson and Josephine counties on the good roads bond measure were about the same proportion of affirmative and negative votes.

The total vote in Jackson county was 3,258 of which 1,830 were for the bonds and 1,428 against. Practically the same percentage prevailed in Josephine county.

Had it not been for the strong vote in Medford favoring the bonds where a majority of 464 was rolled up in their favor, Jackson county would have shown a vote against good roads.

SECOND ARSON TRIAL STARTS NEXT WEEK

Jacksonville, Ore., June 6.—The new trial of Mrs. M. M. Garwood on a charge of arson has been set for next Monday morning.

This is one of the most sensational cases that ever came up in the county. Last week Mrs. Garwood was tried on the charge of conspiring to burn the Strickfadden house in Ashland last March, and the jury failed to reach an agreement, standing six for conviction and six for acquittal.

Just before the Garwood case came the trial of Mrs. Nan Strickfadden and Mrs. Dreyfoos, her sister, who were indicted on the same charge, pleaded guilty before Judge Calkins and later turned state's evidence against Mrs. Garwood.

ASK INCOME TAX BE PAID WITHOUT DELAY

Portland, June 6.—Help your Uncle Sam by paying your income tax without delay.

This is the appeal that Milton A. Miller, collector of internal revenue, is making today to all those individuals fortunate enough to have an income that comes within the limits of the federal income law.

Miller explains that our Uncle Sam needs the money right now and that prompt paying of income taxes would be a big help. He asks that income taxes be paid by June 15. An appeal similar to this sent out by Miller some time ago met with a hearty response.

NATION'S REGISTRATION WILL EXCEED EXPECTATIONS

Washington, June 6.—From returns received at the adjutant general's office, it is apparent that the registration in the country is going to exceed the war department's estimate. In some districts nearly half the population registered.

Save in New York, there was practically no trouble. From state after state, telegrams that a full registration had quietly gone to the polls and listed their names, came to headquarters.

A typical telegram read: "Registration will be 100 per cent, spontaneous and without murmur."

A feature of the registration was the refusal of hundreds of thousands of men to make any reply to the question, "Do you claim exemption?" Even men who reported that they had dependent families; men with obvious physical disabilities and those whose occupations are certain to make such a claim. Apparently they have entered fully into the very spirit of the law. They are content to leave the question to the examination boards. With the closing of each registration precinct, officials went at once to the task of sorting and classifying the cards. There is much work to be done before this work is completed.

OHIO HAS STARTED HALF MILLION GARDENS

Columbus, O., June 6.—Ohio's systematic method of tackling the food problem has resulted, it was announced today in 500,000 backyard gardens being started. This puts 25,000 additional acres under cultivation and assures an extra crop worth at least \$1,000,000.
