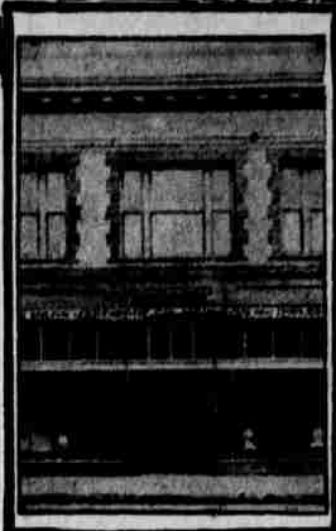

EX-CONFEDERATES MARCHING IN REVIEW

Washington, June 4.—Thousands of Confederate veterans representing every state in Dixie, carried their battle flags down Pennsylvania avenue today in a parade that is the climax of their 27th annual reunion. Patriotism reached its highest mark here since the break with Germany, for this was registration day. Every man in Washington of military age had been asked by presidential decree to register for service against a foreign foe.

Aged and bent, the onetime Johnny Rebs marched between lines of cheering spectators. Many men of the Blue who fought against them were also in line. With spirit unbroken, with gleaming eyes, the men who fought under Lee and Jackson, Stuart and Johnson, were jubilant at participating in a great pageant that marks the dawn of a new nation.

Flags of the allied nations, familiar sights through Washington through the spring, were today hung alongside the Stars and Bars—the emblem of the Confederacy. Streets and avenues presented a colorful spectacle in this galaxy of banners. President Wilson and governmental officials reviewed the veterans, in front of the White House. After the parade, luncheon was served in the Ellipse.

For the first time in the history of the nation, a Confederate reunion was held north of the Mason-Dixon line. Heretofore sentiment prevented holding these yearly gatherings on soil outside the Confederacy. Churches and public buildings have been thrown open to house the visiting veterans. From the war department thousands of coats and blankets were secured to use in the impromptu dormitories.
