BOYS MAKING GOOD THINNING SUGAR BEETS

For the last ten days local boys under the supervision of a foreman supplied by the sugar company, have been thinning beets in the fields which are being handled by the Grants Pass Beet Growing company. The work on the Lathrop ranch, three miles down the river, was completed Monday morning. There have been from 20 to 25 boys working in this field.

These boys have been paid at the rate of \$7 per acre. The total amount paid to the boys was \$150 in checks ranging from 30 cents to 23 dollars.

Twelve of these boys have been sent to Grenada, Cal., to thin beets in the Shasta valley. They are in charge of James Hood as foreman and will probably be gone from ten days to two weeks. The sugar company pays their railroad fare both ways and will pay them \$7 per acre for thinning beets in that district.

One crew of six local boys are still thinning beets in this district on the Elsmann ranch, one of the properties being handled by the Grants Pass Beet Growing company. They will finish work on this ranch some time this week.

The experiment of using local boys in this class of work has proved satisfactory and from year to year this will, no doubt, prove to be a very profitable vacation occupation for the boys in this community as well as all communities where beets are raised.
