MOBILIZE THE DOLLARS

The fact that you may not be selected to go to the front as a fighting unit for the defense of your country does not exempt you from patriotic service.

You may be over age, you may be under height, you may have defective physique or imperfect health, but these do not disqualify you from being a man or woman who must do your part at home where most of the work of winning the war is to be done.

Your earnings may be small, you may have few savings or none, but so long as you have any earning power whatever you can serve your country best in this tremendous crisis by making an extra effort at saving and investing in a Liberty loan bond.

Help to support a soldier at the front. Back of each soldier must stand the dollars of the American people. The masses of the people must rise to the emergency and raise this \$2,000,000,000 loan or invite defeat in Europe.

All wealth spring from the earnings of the people. And all the nation's activities must be paid for out of the purses of the people. You want peace and you will have to pay for it before you can secure it.

SITUATION IS FINE FOR APPLE MARKET

Hood River, Ore., June 8.—Joseph Steinhardt, member of the fruit commission firm of Steinhardt & Kelley of New York, after visiting the several fruit sections in Oregon and Washington, spent the day at Hood River in conference with the Apple Growers' association.

"The action of Food Commissioner Hoover in placing the apple on the list of food necessities is the salvation of the entire industry this year," said Mr. Steinhardt. "The railroads will now be compelled to furnish cars to move the fruit tonnage to eastern and other markets and the growers need have no fear over the matter of car shortage for the handling of this season's apple crop."

"If the embargo was lifted this season, I do not think that it would materially help the boxed apple industry of the northwest, for the reason that bottoms would be so scarce and freight so high, that only a small portion of the fruit would find its way into foreign markets."

"Apple will be king this year. Sugar is high; cans and fruit jars will be hard to secure, consequently there will be a tremendous shortage of canned fruits and berries with which to enter the winter season, and for this reason the apple will be the one fruit that must take the place of the canned fruit."

DOERNER WRITES OF ARMY DUTIES

The following excerpt from a letter written by Robert F. Doerner will be of interest to the many friends of the boys mentioned. Young Doerner is a member of Company B, First Provisional Aviation School Squadron now stationed at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

"As yet we are not restricted in any kind of correspondence. But there is a bunch that is leaving for some place—where, they know not. Even the persons in charge will receive their instructions only every hundred miles or thereabouts. Indefinitely—the end of the journey is France."

"I am with Charlie Holland, Clifton Booth, Bert Coffenberry, Le Roy, Newton Gotcher, Ray Bailey, Ray Briggs and Ernest Fry."

"As long as I am not sick and in as much as I can do no good by 'kicking' I take what ever comes as a matter of course. At present we are taken care of very well indeed."

"At present our company is on guard duty. We are on guard for 24 hours (that is, 50 out of 150 of us) out of 36 hours. The 24 hours that we are on duty, the 50 of us are divided into three reliefs of 15 men each; and of the other five there is one corporal in each relief, and two sergeants who divide up the 24 hours between them. We go on guard at 6 p. m. and are relieved by the next 50 men at 6 p. m. the next day. At six o'clock the first relief of 15 men are posted on 15 posts, relieving the men of the old guard. They walk their posts until eight o'clock, when the second relief of 15 men come on;—they in turn walk their post until 12 o'clock. Thus during the 24 hours on duty, each guard has two hours on and four hours off, alternately."

"This guard duty is a pretty serious thing, if a guard goes to sleep
