London, June 8.—Introducing Harry McMichael of Augusta, Ga. Mac has been strated thrice by the Kaiser's missiles, but he hasn't taken the count yet and all he wants is another shot at a spiked helmet.

Mac learned the game in the Second United States Cavalry. He joined the Fifteenth Canadian battalion in June, 1915. A machine gun bullet hit his leg in the fall of that year. Back from the hospital, a shell fragment nicked his brow as he went "over the top" in a charge.

Back once more from "blighty," Mac took a stretch and a yawn in view of the German trenches and a bullet bored his jaw, removing five teeth. Today, in the hospital, this soldier of the south is just getting on his feet again. He wants to join the Americans when they arrive—and his ear is eager for the welcome sound of "Dixie."

FRENCH AGAIN CHECK COUNTER-OFFENSIVE

Paris, June 8.—Yesterday was a quiet day along the French front. A German attack against the French lines northwest of St. Quentin was easily repulsed, and along the Chemin-des-Dames front artillery action was violent.

But today the Germans have apparently started a strong counter-offensive, according to the official statement. Violent artillery bombardments are being hurled against long sections of the French front, especially around St. Quentin and Lafore. All German infantry attacks have failed.

Washington, June 8.—The Shipping board has announced today that it has approved contracts for 100 wooden ships and the same will be let within the next ten days.

Hogs Need Pastureage.

It will be necessary to plant a succession of pasture crops for your hogs if you do not have sufficient permanent pasture. Cheap pork cannot be produced in pens. The hogs must have pasture crops that supply plenty of grazing of the right kind. Even where one has but one brood sow and expects to raise two litters a year some grazing must be had to give the proper gains on the pigs. Make your arrangements for pasture crops for your hogs.
