PROHIBITION WINS

The editor of this paper has been the recipient of a few caustic criticisms because of his having referred editorially to the need of national prohibition during the war.

We beg leave to call the attention of the few who have been indulging in such pastime to the statement made by Congressman Sheppard, leader of the dry forces in congress, that the constant editorial bombardment on the part of the newspapers of the country favoring war prohibition has been the cause of that change of sentiment among members of congress which will bring about a dry nation.

There are two great benefits which will accrue to the American people as a result of this war. One will be the certainty, or strong probability, of lasting peace,—doing away with the necessity of war preparation; and the second will be the forced economic and social changes, due to war, and war preparation by our people. In this second category the most valuable change that seems probable will be national prohibition.

It is coming as sure as the sun rises on the morrow, and will usher in a new era for the 100,000,000 people of this great nation.

TRENCH TALES

London, June 15.—"No there's very little bayonet work done by the Boches," said a Scotch sergeant discussing German methods of fighting. "I'll tell you a queer thing that happened to a chap in my lot. Some wounded got left in a village we got into. We weren't meant to take it but these chaps were eager and went on too far. Some of us went up to bring the wounded back on stretchers. When we were just outside the village, the Germans put over a barrage—something, terrific it was, and we ran back to a trench. This chap I'm talking about jumped down into it without looking out, and the first thing he knew was that something had shot through his leg and he saw the point of a bayonet sticking out of his thigh. The trench was full of our reserves and he had jumped down onto a man's bayonet. All the chap that owned the bayonet said was 'A blighty one for you, mate.' I've seen him since and he said the doctor at the clearing station told him it was only the second bayonet wound he'd seen during the war."

The woman who seven years ago attracted nation-wide attention by suggesting the annual observance of a day set apart in memory of our fathers, now urges the doing of one kindly act on June 17 this year in commemoration of Father's day. In this connection, Mrs. Dodd suggests that each person choose for himself the nature of the kindly deed, bearing in mind the thought that the deed be something which would meet with a fathers' approval. Mrs. Dodd herself finds in the Red Cross work an inspiration for her own good deeds.

The third Sunday in June was selected as Father's day when the movement began in 1910. In Spokane red roses are worn on that occasion if the father be living—white roses if he is dead. Special sermons are delivered in the churches, ministers taking as a favorite subject the example of the father in the parable of the prodigal son. Last year the day was celebrated by the chorus of 1,000 boys singing at the interstate fair grounds.
