A LITTLE SLOW

There is one man about town who may learn a few things about the United States government when at war. If he does not want to contribute to the Red Cross he is privileged to refuse; but when he accompanies his refusal with the vilest kind of abuse of the order, and of the government and the administration at Washington, it may be time that he should be taught that such is not entirely a healthy pastime in days like the present.

MASTERY OF THE AIR

Germany has the most gigantic and complete war machine the world has ever known. It is in good running order right now. The peril of the submarine is still acute. Time is working against it, but a successful coping with the problems it presents has yet to be worked out.

It seems that America's one best chance to throw a deciding factor into the contest quickly lies in the aeroplane. With an absolute mastery of the air over the fighting lines of France, the death knell of Prussian militarism will have been rung.

There was never reasonable expectation that our flying squadrons would at once enter upon war duties; men have much to learn and practice here and in the French aviation fields, and our manufacturers have had no experience with the sort of machines the French and British have developed in two and a half years of warfare. The difficulties the manufacturers have to deal with are of a more or less technical character, not easily overcome. But it is impossible to accept the statement that we are unequal to the full task. Precisely what is under way there is no sound reason perhaps for disclosing. There can be no harm in affirming, however, that we shall do better than current reports from Washington indicate.

Some 6,000 young men are ready for preliminary instruction in the art of flying. Before very long there will be groups of them in France undergoing training in the real business at hand.

NO SLACKERS

Let no one imagine that this is not his war. The seriousness of the situation confronting the country is not to be discounted. And the situation is your situation.

Because you live in one of the sun-kissed valleys of southern Oregon beside the calmly flowing Rogue river, is no reason why the critical problems of national existence and well-being should not come home to each of you.

AUSTRIA IS FACING A SERIOUS CRISIS

London, June 20.—Emperor Charles of Austria is confronted with the most difficult task he has met since he ascended the throne. The entire cabinet has resigned. The differences among the various factions, as emphasized by dispatches coming from Vienna via Amsterdam, make it extremely difficult to arrange a cabinet which will meet with the support of all factions or enough of them to insure a stable government.

STRIKE ON STREETCARS IN PERU IS SETTLED

Lima, Peru, June 20.—The strike of streetcar employees for higher wages ended at noon today. Traffic had been suspended for a week.

EXEMPTION RULES BEING WORKED OUT

Washington, June 20.—The war department will assign the men selected through the conscription process to the different branches of the service at the discretion of the provost marshal-general according to an official announcement made here today. The men will not be allowed to pick the arm of the service they are to enter.

Most of the conscripts will be assigned to infantry and none will be assigned to the navy.

General Crowder declared that there would be two kinds of exemptions: permanent and conditional. Occupational exemptions will probably be classed as conditional. The exemption will cease when the holder changes occupation.

WOULD HAVE CABINET SIT WITH CONGRESSMEN

New York, June 20.—A movement to give members of President Wilson's cabinet and chairmen of important committees seats on the floor of congress was opened in the senate Monday. Senator McLean of Connecticut introduced a resolution, providing the cabinet, chairmen of the federal trade commission, tariff commission, shipping board, efficiency board, interstate commerce commission be given such seats.

NEW PERFECTION OIL COOK STOVE Week

LIBERTY BONDS ARE WAY ABOVE PAR IN CHICAGO

Chicago, June 20.—Advertisements by Chicago merchants appeared in morning papers today offering as high as \$105 for Liberty bonds, that value being offered when the sale was made in exchange for merchandise.

An even purchase of \$100 worth of merchandise could be paid for with a \$100 bond the purchaser receiving \$5 in cash in change.

The same offer was extended to affect larger and smaller bonds.

OREGON CITIES MAY LOOSE RIGHTS TO WATER

Salem, Ore., June 20.—As the state water board has been unable to get replies to queries addressed to the cities of Newberg, Bandon, Prineville and Klamath Falls, the board decided at its last meeting to give those cities until the next meeting of the board in which to inform the board as to the work being done under their permits to appropriate water for municipal purposes or the permits will be canceled.

SPANISH AMBASSADOR TO FRANCE IS RETAINED

Paris, June 20.—According to a Havas Madrid dispatch, the Spanish Ambassador at Paris, Marquis Del

Muni, presented his resignation in accordance with the custom when the liberal party went out of power. The new government, however, has refused to accept it, appealing instead to his patriotism and asking him to continue in collaboration with the new government officials.

REGISTRATION TOTAL WILL BE ALMOST TEN MILLION

Washington, June 20.—Almost complete returns on the registrations under the selective draft law received at the provost marshal-general's office today totaled 9,611,811.

Wyoming was the only state from which no returns had been received.

BIDS OPENED FOR NEW STRAHORN RAILROAD

Klamath Falls, June 20.—The railway bids were opened at 1 o'clock today but as Engineer Bogue was busy all afternoon on right-of-way matters, they have not been canvassed fully and the list of bidders has not been made public. The bids will be gone over fully and the contracts probably let tomorrow.

AUSTRIAN ATTACKS ARE REPULSED BY ITALIANS

Rome, via London, June 20.—Infantry attacks were launched last night by the Austro-Hungarians

against the Italian positions on Monte Moselagh on the Asiago Plateau and on Hill 652 in the Vodic, and were broken up by the Italian fire, the war department announced today.

The Italians made an advance on the Carso Plateau northeast of Jamiano and recaptured a large portion of their front.

SO. AMERICAN VESSEL SUNK BY GERMANS

New York, June 20.—A report that the Uruguayan bark Rosario, 1,495 tons, has been sunk by a German submarine off the French coast, was confirmed by officers of a British trans-Atlantic freight ship today. The English vessel picked up the chief officers and eight men and transferred them to a French patrol boat.

The fate of the captain and other members of the crew who also had taken to small boats is unknown. The sinking took place June 3.

SWISS MINISTER IS COMING TO UNITED STATES

Berne, via Paris, June 20.—Dr. Hans Sulzer, the new Swiss Minister to the United States, will leave here July 5 on his way to Washington. Dr. Sulzer will be accompanied by an extraordinary commission of commercial experts.
