HOW TO CAN FRUIT AND NOT USE SUGAR

Washington, June 28.—Fruit for use in pie or salads or as stewed fruit can be put up or canned without the use of any sugar at all, according to the canning specialists of the agricultural department. They, therefore, advise those who, because of the high price of sugar, have been thinking of reducing the amount of fruit they put up, to can as much of their surplus as possible by the use of boiling water when sugar syrup is beyond their means. Any fruit, they say, may be successfully sterilized and retained in the pack by simply adding boiling water instead of the hot sirup.

Can the product the same day it is picked. Cull, stem, or seed, and clean the fruit by placing it in a strainer and pouring water over it until it is clean. Pack the product thoroughly in glass jars or tin cans until they are full; use the handle of a tablespoon, wooden ladle, or table knife for packing purposes. Pour over the fruit boiling water from a kettle, place rubbers and caps in position, partially seal if using glass jars, seal completely if using tin cans. Place the containers in a sterilizing vat such as a wash boiler with false bottom, or other receptacle improvised for the purpose. If using a hot water bath outfit, process for 30 minutes; count time after the water has reached the boiling point; the water must cover the highest jar in container. After sterilizing remove packs, seal glass jars, wrap in paper to prevent bleaching and store in a dry, cool place.

If you are canning in tin cans it will improve the product to plunge the cans quickly into cold water immediately after sterilization. When using a steam pressure canner instead of the hot water bath, sterilize for 10 minutes with five pounds of steam pressure. Never allow the pressure to go over 10 pounds.

LOANS TO ALLIES WILL SOON BE TWO BILLION

Washington, June 28.—Loans to the allies by the United States are nearing the \$2,000,000,000 mark. Tuesday the government loaned Great Britain \$15,000,000 and France \$10,000,000. The total of these loans to the allies to date is \$1,800,000,000.

INVESTING MONEY.

When "Safety First" and Not Large Returns is the Object.

"A conservative policy would prompt all buyers of securities to invest at least a portion of their capital in government issues or some other form of sound bonds," says Leslie's Weekly. "Many investors have a preference exclusively for stocks because the latter may render a higher yield or may fluctuate more widely, thus offering larger chances for speculative profit. Dividend paying shares of the season's sort are not to be belittled, and they will perhaps always form the major portion of the average investor's purchases. There is reasonable safety in them.

"But firmer 'cornerstones of fortune' are found in the better class bonds. These are not necessarily gilt edged, but they are well secured. In times of prosperity the issuing corporations have no difficulty in meeting interest charges. In times of depression dividends on stocks may be suspended, but the enterprise must pay interest on its bonds or submit to foreclosure. And in such event the bondholder rarely suffers loss. Their high degree of stability and safety commends good bonds as an indispensable part of any well established estate."

ECONOMY IN FOOD.

Getting the Best Results Out of a Forequarter of Lamb.

Are you aware of how much you can get from a forequarter of lamb? If it is cut correctly it should give a rack of lamb (French chops) and a shoulder, besides the neck and the breast, which may be boiled.

From these last parts one can make croquettes, a meat loaf, minced lamb on toast and salad, besides many other cooked meat dishes. The shoulder can be filled and roasted, boiled with caper sauce or pot au feu.

The rack, which is made up of delicate French chops, is the choicest part of the entire lamb, and if the butcher cuts the forequarter correctly there will be twelve delicious chops. These may be cut as needed or roasted in one piece.

To cut the forequarter correctly remove the shoulder and take off all the bone; cut off the neck and breast, then remove the chine and the chops. Don't throw away the bones and trimmings. Roll and strain them, then set aside to cool and remove the fat, which then can be used for deep fat frying.—Washington Star.

struction and will take steps for the letting of contracts for hard-surfacing.

Some time ago the commission arranged with George H. Cecil, district forester at Portland, a program for improvement and construction of forest roads in the state during the next three years. Forest roads are those in forest reserves.

The grand total of government funds to be spent on these forest roads is estimated at \$491,250, to be matched by a state appropriation of like amount. The total fund contemplated in the forest road program in three years is \$1,114,194.

Of these forest roads now agreed upon is that between this city and Crescent City, on which the United States government is to spend \$15,000 and the state, \$15,000; also the Medford-Klamath Falls road via Crater Lake on which the federal government is to spend \$45,000; the state \$45,000 and Jackson county \$25,000.

THE UMBRELLA AN ILLUSION?

Well, How About the Millinery and Straw Hats It Saves?

The psychology of the umbrella is worth studying. It does not really, of course, protect the individual from the rain. It does little more than shelter his head. The rain strikes his legs and his body just the same. But it saves the rain from striking one's face, which is disagreeable.
