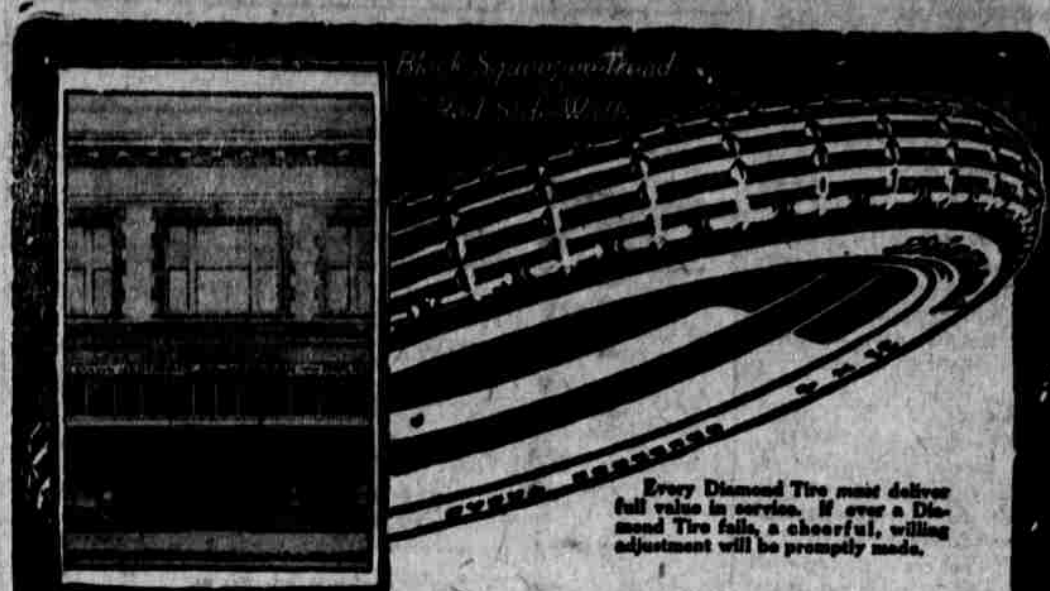

Hudson River.
The entire length of the Hudson river is 300 miles. From Troy to the mouth of the river in New York bay, a distance of 150 miles, the river is tidal, owing to the low grade of its bed, by which the ocean tide is able to back up. It is this lower tidal navigable portion of the Hudson that is of so much importance, and of course the water is salt. It is regarded really an estuary of the sea. Above Albany and Troy the river is a small stream, and to its source the water is fresh.

One phase of the subject is instructive and significant. This is "the removal of the powerful effect of poverty on the mind, and its replacement by the higher standard of living and remunerative employment." Poverty and unemployment are thus by medical testimony more fertile causes of insanity than war.—London Globe.

ROSARIANS DEDICATE NEW AUDITORIUM AT PORTLAND

Portland, July 5.—Portlanders got their first look into the interior of their big new auditorium Wednesday morning, when a dedicatory program was carried out under the auspices of the Royal Rosarians, assisted by the Monday Musken club and the Daughters of the Confederacy. The program was featured with music.

A music festival, featuring Mary Jordan, will open tonight in the auditorium, ending Sunday night. The National Educational association, meeting here July 7-14, will be the first organization to hold a convention in the big building. Officials of the association gathered here today preparing for the convention, say the building is the most modern one of its kind they have seen, although not as large as many other auditoriums in other cities.

Curious Turkish Food.

Three singular preparations of grape juice are known in Turkey. One consists of sheets resembling leather, made by evaporating grape juice to the consistency of molasses, then mixing flour with it and drying it in the sun. Another is in cakes half an inch thick. It is made by using coarse wheat grits instead of flour to mix with the grape molasses and is dried on metal plates.

A still more savory preparation is made by stringing walnut meats on twine and then immersing the strings thus formed in the mixture of flour and grape juice. When coated about a quarter of an inch thick the strings are hung up to dry.—New York Tribune.

TEACHERS WILL BE ASKED TO HELP FOOD CONSERVATION

Portland, July 5.—Charles A. Van Hise, president of the University of Wisconsin and the personal representative of Herbert Hoover, food administrator, is expected to arrive in Portland today to attend the national educational association convention, which opens here Monday. He will ask the co-operation of the teachers of the United States in the government's food conservation program, and explain the need of such legislation.

JEWISH NATION IN PALESTINE AFTER WAR

New York, July 5.—A Jewish nation with modern cities, a free government and a population of 2,000,000 will be established in Palestine after the war, in the opinion of Nathan Strauss, philanthropist.

He looks for a marked exodus of Jews from the United States and other countries, back to their fatherland. Religious Jews, he believes, will not hesitate to give up their wealth and property in America and return to Palestine to fulfill the Biblical prophecy. Strauss also expects thousands of Christians to go there.

"We will establish a government along whatever lines the allies suggest," declared Strauss. "There is no selfishness about it. The Bible says we will have our own country back and the allies are winning it back. They must decide what is best."

He indicated, however, that a republican form of government under a protectorate of the powers would be best. Asked whether the country would be modernized, as Manila has been, he said:

"Given half a chance we will make it the Paradise of the earth. It will be up-to-date in every particular. The Palestine soil is better than that of California—I'm satisfied of that through my own experiments. The Jewish nation will be self-supporting. I don't think we will establish great industries and compete in the world trade because the country will be more of a religious community than a commercial one. Palestine will support 2,000,000 people, and it only has 600,000 now. Educationally and religiously it will be the promised land of the whole world."
