Amusements during the afternoon consisted of foot races, horse races, etc., but perhaps the most interesting was the rock drilling contest between the teams from the mines.

Three teams entered the contest. Ramsey and Witchell from the Queen of Bronze; Smith and Snider from the Queen of Bronze; and Freeman and Nutt from the Waldo mine. The time limit for each team was ten minutes. A good deal of excitement developed as the drilling went on. Considerable money at stake indicated the opinion of the different backers of the teams. Ramsey and Witchell in 16 minutes drilled a depth of 12 inches. Smith and Snider next began and as they worked interest and excitement grew and when their time was up all were anxious to know the result. When measured the depth was found to be 13 1/4 inches. Then the crowd gave vent to their feelings in cheer upon cheer. The sympathy seemed to be in favor of Smith and Snider. Freeman and Nutt came next. They worked hard and faithfully but met with some mishaps which delayed them and rather helped to discourage. But they continued until the close. A depth of eight inches was made.

The baseball game came next. A good deal of parleying delayed the beginning of the game and it was after 4 o'clock before the game was started. Some accidents occurred during the game in which Dick Jones was knocked out by a pitched ball. He was unconscious for some time, but it is thought he will recover in a short time. Charles Gilmore received a hit on the knee but not so severe as to disable him. At the close the game was a tie, 9 to 9.
