TEACHING PATRIOTISM

America's entry into the world war has given rise to a number of organizations, each seeking to promote the nation's unity and efficiency in its new and unusual sphere of activity. For the United States, like any democracy, was not organized along war-making lines.

One of these new agencies is the National Security League with headquarters at New York City. It might be said to be an organization of college and university faculty members, chautauqua speakers, magazine writers, editors, and, in fact, publicists in general. In the organization of the league and formulation of its plans, which were accomplished at a five-day patriotic gathering at Chautauqua, New York, July 2-7, twenty-five states were officially represented by delegates appointed by their respective governors, and, through sub-committees, the work had been actively started in 18 states in less than two weeks.

The league's plan is to organize through its committee of patriotism through education, of which Prof. Albert Bushnell Hart, of Harvard University, is chairman, a system of addresses on patriotic and war topics by means of which trained speakers will carry into every city, town and hamlet in every state in the union the following message.—The causes of the war, the reasons for the entrance of this country into the conflict, what the United States must do to carry out its part, and the knowledge that not only the existence of democracy in the abstract, but also the very life of this nation itself depends upon victory over Germany.

The plans of the league include, first, using the ready made audiences of the chautauqua circuits and university extension bureaus; second, organizing special meetings (the organizations already having promised to co-operate in securing audiences for this purpose representing a total membership of over 10,000,000 people); and, third, using the universities and colleges as centers of patriotic influence. Already more than 100 universities and over 400 university and college presidents and professors have enlisted in the work.

If the security league accomplishes even in a partial degree its broad objects it will serve a wonderful purpose. It undertakes to rouse the individual citizens of the United States to a realization of the meaning of the war and the importance of personal service and sacrifice in bringing it to a successful conclusion.

munity in the United States will hear one, two or half a dozen such addresses as people of Grants Pass heard when Prof. Irving Vining visited this city last month. It is a great undertaking.

ERA OF SAVING

Economists predict that the sale and distribution among the people in a large number of small holdings, of the government bonds being issued by warring nations, will usher in a period of economy and saving such as has never been known before. It is believed that this era has commenced in America.

The American people are now thoroughly informed in the matter of government bonds and it seems the consensus of opinion of authorities on such matters that the next Liberty bond issue will sell more readily than the \$2,000,000,000 issue which has just been over-subscribed fifty per cent. Thrift joins with patriotism and humanity to make the next bond issue a success.

The opinion is also expressed that the savings bank deposits in this country will grow as this habit of thrift grows. The small purchasers of Liberty loan bonds did not pay for their bonds with money drawn from savings banks, but are now paying for them out of new savings, and the habit of thrift thus brought about will increase savings bank deposits.

This has been the experience of England. Great Britain has sold since the war began over \$10,000,000,000 in war bonds to her citizens, yet the savings banks deposits in England and Wales alone increased \$60,000,000 in 1916.

How and Why It Rains.

Rain is an accumulation of the tiny particles of the vapor of the atmosphere into drops. These drops, first small of size, attract others of their kind and become drops of such magnitude that they fall to the earth because of their weight. There is a limit to the quantity of water which the air is capable of absorbing and retaining as invisible vapor. Warm air is able to hold more than cold air; hence when the air which is saturated with moisture becomes cold for any reason whatever it can no longer retain its moisture. A portion must under such condition accumulate into drops. These fall to the earth in the shape of rain.

particular enemy will be off the board.

The infantry soldiers of the small British army which Lord French took to France at the beginning of the war were able to check the assaults of many times their number of Prussians. The men could shoot straight and they knew it. When the Prussians came on they mowed them down. If they had not been good shots their courage would have availed them nothing.

On the first day of the battle of Gettysburg, General Doubleday was very anxious to hold a forward position athwart the Chambersburg pike. He ordered up Stone's brigade of Pennsylvania troops and Stone formed his men behind a ridge sheltered by a stone fence. It was a hot place. The whole ground was alive with bursting shells. The men said, "General, we've come to stay." Those men died where they stood.

DRAFT LIST WILL BE
MAILED TOMORROW

Washington, July 24.—Mechanical difficulties in the printing plant have delayed the mailing of the official lists of the army selective draft until probably tomorrow.

The governors of each state will be furnished with two copies for each local board of his state which he will be asked to mail separately to insure delivery.

Immediately on receipt of their lists, each local board will cancel the numbers higher than the top red ink number in its district and then, from the remaining numbers, enough men to make up double the district's quota will be notified to appear for physical examination.

MANY STATES REPRESENTED
ON MONTANA STUDENT ROLL

Missoula, Mont., July 24.—Twenty-two states are represented among the 250 students enrolled today at the summer session of the State University of Montana. New York, Georgia, Tennessee and Wisconsin are among those represented.

REGULATIONS EXTEND
TO COVER SCRAP IRON

Portland, July 24.—The federal government will extend its long arm to the regulation of scrap iron and old metal of all kinds, according to the opinion of junk dealers here today.

The price of scrap iron has advanced 450 per cent in the last three years. Metal worth no more than \$5 a ton before the war now brings \$22 a ton at Seattle rolling mills.

The dealers, while discussing prices with no particular enthusiasm and fearing to be quoted, do, however, give some figures that point to a skyrocketing of material quotations. Aluminum and copper command record prices with junk men, bring 23 and 27½ cents a pound respectively.

Some exceptions to the general rule, however, appear. Waste paper, for instance, does not command the high price of a few years ago. Magazines and books are in poorest demand. Old newspaper prices continue firm.

Old rubber is much lower than a year ago, due to the fact that it is impossible to ship it to Germany. German manufacturers, it is said, are in possession of secret formulas for utilization of old rubber stock.

Glass Houses and Stones.

The phrase "Those who live in glass houses should not throw stones" had its origin in England. When the Scotch went over in thousands with James I. the English were greatly enraged against them, and, instigated by the Duke of Buckingham and others, the windows and the houses occupied by these interlopers were broken in all directions. A party of Scotchmen combined and retaliated by smashing the windows of Buckingham's mansion, which was called "the glass house," and the duke brought his complaint to the king, who answered, "Those who live in glass houses shouldn't throw stones."
