PUBLICITY FIGHT ON FOOD SPECULATIONS

Washington, July 28.—Exposure of food speculators through publicity. In cases where their operations are within the law, and recommendations to congress for remedial legislation covering marketing and handling of food products are the present aims of the federal trade commission in its inquiry into prices being made at the direction of President Wilson. The commission is making a tremendous effort to get results by the time the food control bill becomes effective. This was explained Thursday by Francis J. Heney, the commission's special investigator. The commission fears that if something cannot be done to better the food price situation the influence of the food administration will be weakened.

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR TEACHERS DURING AUG.

The first annual teachers' training school for Josephine county will be held at the High school building, Grants Pass, August 12 to 31 inclusive. The county superintendent has secured experienced instructors in the following subjects: English Grammar; English and American Literature; Writing—Palmer system; Practical Agricultural; Freehand Art and Design; Manual Training, and Household Economics. All those expecting to teach in this county for the coming year who have not had 27 months teaching experience, eight of these in this state, or are not graduates of a standard normal school, are required by law to attend this training school.
