BAPTISTS TAKE LEAD  
IN TWILIGHT SERIES

The Baptists went into the lead in the Twilight league by defeating the Christians 3-2 last evening in a game well played before an enthusiastic crowd of routers for both teams.

The feature of the game were a freak triple play, the pitching of Veteran John Summers and the base running of Johnny Smith. General Summers had allowed his juniors to occupy the mound during the previous games, but when the critical series drew near he began limbering up the old reliable souper, and, putting Johnny Smith behind the bat, he went to the firing line himself and served up that famous fade-away. In the first two innings none of the Christian players got on first base, but Prof. Hull, first up in the third inning got a safe hit down past third base. Swinney was allowed a base on balls and then Launer hit one back at Summers. John bluffed a throw to third base to head off the professor, then made the assist at first base, retiring Launer. Swinney having made second safely, Hull was forced toward third, but the relay from Scoville to Birchard was ahead of him and he was out. Meantime, Swinney walked unconcernedly off second base and was tagged for the third out. The Christians made their two runs in the fourth inning. Ross, safe on Scoville's error, scored when Morrow hit out a triple. Morrow, in turn, scored on Wilbur Bearas' single, but Bearas was out trying to steal second. In the fifth inning Bratton got a three base hit, but died on third base, as his team mates were unable to do anything.

For three innings the Baptists were unable to connect with Bratton's curves, but in the fourth Stanley Summers made second base when Hull failed to hold his high fly. He scored when W. Bearas failed to hold Ross' assist on H. Bearas' infield tap. After H. Bearas was thrown out at third base, trying to steal, Birchard came through with a clean single past second base, but was out when, with no coacher to advise him, he stepped off first base while the baseman held the ball. In the fifth, J. Summers was safe on Ross' error; Bratton passed both Johnny Smith and Kearns, and then Gebers beat out a hit to Morrow. Summers scored easily and Johnny Smith put on his feature act, going all the way home from second, with the winning run, while the Christian's infield was tossing the ball around first base. The game was over so abruptly that most of the players, as well as the spectators, did not understand why they were quitting.

The Christians made four hit, while the Baptists made only two. Bratton struck out eight men; Summers, three. Christians were charged with four errors; Baptists, one. Bratton passed three and hit one; Summers passed one.

The final game of the season will be on Friday evening, starting promptly at 6:30, when the Methodists will endeavor to take the first place away from the leading Baptists.

CENSOR ALLOWS WORD  
OF ORIENT SHIPPING

The committee on public information by George Creel, chairman, has issued a censorship bulletin, reading as follows:

Subject to cancellation at the request of the navy department should need arise, it is possible to give to the Pacific coast newspapers the privilege of publishing the arrivals and departures of merchantmen to and from Japan and China. Permission was given in the Bulletin of June 14, which this Bulletin supersedes, to publish the arrival and departure of vessels engaged in American coastwise trade and the arrival and departure of vessels plying between the Pacific coast and Hawaii. This permission continues.

The movement of all merchantmen in the Atlantic, trans-Atlantic or war zone trade must remain scrupulously safeguarded, directly and indirectly. No hint of their names, routes, times of departure, destinations, or cargoes is permissible.

AIR FIGHTING IS A

Today I stood on a British aerodrome just behind the lines watching the practice flights of the youngsters stationed there when a speck in the eastern sky caused someone to remark:

"Here comes a bird! It's Pat. Watch him."

I watched. At 120 miles an hour the speck came at us. Suddenly, at a height of about a mile the machine slowly turned over sideways, then plunged earthward upside down.

"He's done himself in!" someone exclaimed.

It certainly looked so. Pat's machine, the engine stopped, was plunging earthward, perpendicularly, spinning round and round on its own axis. Then, suddenly it straightened out flat, went a hundred yards and shot up into the air, again perpendicularly. Slowly, gracefully the aeroplane turned over on its back, again upside down, looped the loop twice, flew on straight, rolled over and over, plunged sideways, went into another nosedive first with a right hand spin then a left hand one, and so on until he had everyone gasping for breath.

Finally the machine came down and lit on the field. Out of the pilot's seat climbed a hooded, goggles being which, with one quick jerk tore hood and goggles from head and face and behold: A kid, a boy, a stripling just turned 20.

## Fly Repellent For Cows.

Spray mixtures may add to the comfort of a cow by keeping off numerous flies. Several of these compounds may be mixed at home. A mixture recommended for this purpose is given in bulletin 297 of the Ohio experiment station as a hundred parts of fish oil, fifty parts of oil of tar and one part of crude carbolic acid. Another formula is one-half gallon of oil of tar, one-half gallon of cottonseed oil and one-half pint of crude carbolic acid. Such mixtures sprayed on cattle keep off flies for a time.
