Portland, Aug. 1.—Extra caution against forest fires is urged by B. A. Beale, district forecaster of the weather bureau in a bulletin issued at San Francisco July 31. Awards made in the settlement of a general strike about three years ago. Under that award certain back pay was ordered paid to the men by the several railroads involved. The four brotherhoods claim that the Southern Pacific company has refused to pay those amounts, and a conference between the company and representatives of the brotherhoods has been in progress at San Francisco for several weeks.

San Francisco, Aug. 1.—Federal authorities of California, Oregon and Washington, in conjunction with the federal grand jury will begin immediate investigation of the Industrial Workers of the World activities in the street states, according to Assistant Federal Attorney Caspar A. Orban.

Today's announcement followed reports of further destruction of crops in California and of fresh attempts to hinder industry in Oregon and Washington.

Portland, Aug. 1.—The Mazamas, Portland's famous organization of mountain climbers, today are completing arrangements for their annual trip. They will leave for Mt. Jefferson Saturday night.

HOSPITAL SHIP IS ASHORE: NONE LOST

Halifax, Aug. 1.—A hospital ship, carrying over 600 wounded and sick Canadians, is ashore near Chaco Head outside the harbor. The ship is resting easily with a smooth sea.

DROUGHT CUTS DOWN CROPS OVER OREGON

Portland, Aug. 1.—Drought condition in all sections of Oregon have not been broken, according to the summary of crop conditions in the state for the week ending July 28, issued here today by the Portland weather bureau. The summary follows:

"Lower temperatures permitted some improvement, but light scattered showers were insufficient to break the drought, which continues serious in all districts. "Irrigated crops made splendid growth; otherwise oats, spring wheat, corn, potatoes, beans, hops, sugar beets and garden truck were only poor to fair.

"Winter wheat, barley and rye harvest was general with fair to good yields; the long hot spell caused considerable shrinkage in grain, and the quality was not the best.

"Much hay has been gathered in good condition, and the third crop of alfalfa was growing nicely in favored localities.

"Stock doing well on mountain summer range, but elsewhere feed was scarce. It was estimated that about \$100,000 worth of stock has been poisoned in the last two weeks in Klamath county, the cause being attributed to the Industrial Workers of the World."
