MORE ADVICE

Advice is cheap, as we have had occasion to observe before. And like most cheap things it is not given much value by the everyday recipient.

But there is a movement spreading across the land in which every community should play its part and the only way we know of assisting Josephine county to that end is by suggesting what other sections are doing, with the admonition "do thou likewise."

Last spring the nation was asked to produce more food. In general the response was prompt and gratifying.

Now the nation is asked to conserve food, to make the crops raised go as far as possible by drying, preserving and eliminating waste.

Military leaders of America as well as those of our allies, agree that the outcome of the war is largely a matter of food. And the only way that the nation's food supply can be increased in the aggregate is by the little attention to production and conservation rules by a great number of individuals.

The national emergency food commission states that more than 2,000,000 home gardens were planted by the American people this year. The value of the produce raised in these gardens amounts to about \$250,000,000. Much of this produce cannot be economically used as it ripens. It should, therefore, be preserved either by drying or canning.

The state council of defense recently sent a field expert into this county to teach easy, practical home methods of food saving. It is a patriotic duty for the citizens generally to put these methods into practical use whenever and wherever opportunity offers. If the war for world democracy is to be won, its battles must be fought by well-nourished soldiers. And America must feed them. To this end let Americans provide a large part of their own food supply by canning and drying surplus produce and release as much of our supply as possible for use in France.

A member of the British commission recently in this country estimated that American kitchens waste enough food annually to feed the whole British army in France and a considerable part of the French army besides. This food waste amounts to about \$750,000,000 a year. Some of it cannot be prevented. Much can. To the extent that this waste is eliminated, America's food contribution to the allied cause will be increased. To the extent that the individual housewife does her part in a conscientious spirit of real patriotism, will the national waste be eliminated, and total supply increased.

PORTLAND ZOO WILL
SELL WILD ANIMALS

Portland, Aug. 8.—Portland will soon be on the market offering for sale about half the elk, buffalo, black bears, guinea pigs, raccoons, coyotes and other animals in the Washington Park Municipal zoo on account of the high cost of food for the animals and to provide money to erect new quarters for a smaller collection.

Advertisements are to be placed in various northwestern newspapers, it is planned, in the hope of selling the animals to municipalities desiring to increase their zoos or establishing new collections.

Some of the elk will be liberated in Oregon forests, it is planned if they cannot be sold. In the Washington soon at present are 23 elk, 11 buffalo, 300 guinea pigs, and many black bear, deer and other animals. The officials expect to sell the elk for about \$250 a pair and the buffalo for about \$300 a head.

forced to recognize that it was the costliest economy.

The classes of 1916 and 1917 were given an instruction ranging from 9 to 10 months. While this gave better results yet by the time the class of 1918 was called to the colors, Germany was again in such straits for men, that the boys of this class were brought onto the front again with only three months of instruction.

The accuracy of the above figures is confirmed in every capture of prisoners large enough to make a basis of comparison.

PORTLAND DAIRYMEN
TALK OF HARD LUCK

Portland, Aug. 8.—A number of prominent dairymen of this section have called a meeting for Friday morning to discuss ways and means of saving the dairy industry. It is stated that with the present price of milk, farmers are killing their dairy cattle for beef.

Although the price paid to farmers for milk and cream has increased considerably in the last few years, says Mr. Katz, the cost of feed and labor has increased to an extent so much greater that the dairy industry is in danger of being abandoned. Notices of the meeting Friday have been mailed to about 600 dairymen in the vicinity of Portland.
