A GERMAN PEACE

The announcement that Pope Benedict had addressed a formal plea for peace to all nations, both belligerent and neutral, stating certain proposed terms as a "basis for peace discussion," is chiefly of interest because it is perfectly apparent that the proposal emanates from Berlin and Vienna. With that knowledge it amounts practically to a statement of the terms on which the central nations would accept peace.

These terms involve restoring Belgium, Serbia and Roumania to their former independence and some sort of an arbitrating conference, the exact nature of which is only hazily suggested, to determine the status of Alsace Lorraine, Poland, Trieste, the Italian province at the head of the Adriatic, and possibly Turkey.

In other words, Germany is ready to pull out of the war, after having devastated thousands of square miles leaving herself uninjured in any respect, retaining all the territory she ever possessed, and without any suggestion of retribution to France and Belgium for the irreparable wrong done them.

That the allied nations will give a most emphatic negative reply to this Teutonic inspired peace proposal goes without saying. Germany must be taught that international ruthlessness is not a profitable pastime; that military aggression, irrespective of the questions of right or wrong, must be a thing of the past; and that a condition must obtain whereby genuine democracy may prosper and develop without the necessity of spending vast sums to maintain a protective armor against monarchical ambitions.

ANOTHER IRRIGATION MOVE
FOR MEDFORD DISTRICT

The County Court of Jackson county has granted the petition of 75 land owners, and has called a special election for September 15 next, on the question of organizing an irrigation district, comprising all irrigable land between the present canal system of the Rogue River Canal company and what is known as the "proposed high-line ditch". Such an irrigation district would comprise between 20,000 and 25,000 acres and give the lower Rogue River valley a comprehensive irrigation supply.
