INCH BY INCH BRITISH GRIPPING COAL CITY

London, Aug. 23—Lens is the hottest point on the western fighting line today. In spite of the best and most stubborn resistance the Germans could muster, the Canadian lines encircling the city were advanced again today.

It is estimated that the great offensive of the allies have cost the central powers 100,000 men in dead and wounded. At least 21,000 prisoners have been taken on the British, Italian and French fronts. In spite of these tremendous losses, the Germans have started a drive against the Russians on the Riga front.

With British Army in Flanders, Aug. 23—Over 30 consecutive desperate German counter attacks have resulted only in a gain of a few yards at one point near Lens. The Canadians today repulsed more of these counter attacks made by picked German troops.

The Canadians are crawling inch by inch into the city, establishing new advanced posts each day. The outskirts of Lens are firmly held by the Britons.

NURSES MAY BE GIVEN POWER OF OFFICERS

American Training Camp, France, Aug. 23.—A strong movement is on foot here to obtain officers' commissions for the Red Cross nurses, similar to the system prevailing in the Canadian army.

It is obvious that the nurses play an important part in the war work and those who further the movement for commissions hold that it is necessary for them to have power to command. Under present conditions the nurses are able only to make a request when they want something done.

BRITISH AIR FLEET RAIDS TEUTON HARBOR

London, Aug. 23—The admiralty today announced successful British air raids against Zeebrugge harbor and Ghent's aerodrome. A number of hits upon the objectives were observed. All British machines returned uninjured.

BANK CLERK'S NERVE SAVED VALUABLE BOOK

Petrograd, Aug. 2 (By Mail)—A brave bank clerk has made himself the friend of War Minister Kerensky for life.

When the mobs were carrying off the revolution in Petrograd, the police stations were fired.

The crowds believing the fires to have been started by revolutionaries joined in the firemaking with heart and soul. No one seemed to realize that the records of the Black Hundred would be of more use in existence than in a state of ashes. Any attempts of souvenir-seeking on-lookers to seize any of the documents from the bonfires met with resistance from the crowds, who were urged on to this by the detectives and provocators.

Kerensky's new friend was in a crowd near one of the great fires. Among a batch of books and papers which he saw dumped into the blaze was a dossier marked Kerensky. He seized this and, in spite of the efforts of the crowd to take it from him made a speech that persuaded them that the Kerensky record ought to be saved. Though Kerensky, at that time was famous, he was by no means the idol he has since become.

Recently the bank clerk presented the dossier to Kerensky. It consisted of several hundred pages and showed that the secret police had been following the revolutionist for six months, day and night.

NORTHWESTERN MEN MAY GO TO FRANCE

Washington, Aug. 23—The national guardmen that were originally intended to be trained at Palo Alto, Cal., have been shifted to North Carolina, according to an announcement made by the war department today. Among the official circles here this is taken as an indication that after the first two rainbow divisions arrive in France, the third division to be sent will comprise the northwestern guard units. Such an arrangement will affect the Washington, Oregon and Idaho guardmen.

NEW TORPEDO DEVICE IS DEMONSTRATED

Minneapolis, Aug. 23—War demonstrations will rival in interest the contest for the world's speed title at the regatta of the American Power Boat association on the Mississippi River which began here today.

Rear Admiral Bradley A. Fiske, retired, inventor of the Fiske torpedo, made his first public demonstration of his latest war engine, launching torpedoes from a seaplane skimming at full speed on the water. The launching device perfected for this demonstration has not been publicly shown. Four days racing and water sports are scheduled.

LABOR WILL HELP TO TAX ALL WAR PROFITS

Washington, Aug. 23—The American Federation of Labor has joined forces with those who are trying to conscript wealth and war profits.

The wiping out of every penny of war profits is advocated by Samuel Gompers in a statement made here today. Meanwhile the movement started by Senators Johnson and LaFollette has gained much headway and the opponents of conscription wealth have been obliged to organize to start a vigorous fight to save the committee measure.

GERMANY HOLDS COAL THREAT OVER HOLLAND

Washington, Aug. 23—Germany is threatening to give the Netherlands no more steel for ship building, unless her fleet of merchant vessels shall be used in German interests during the war and for five years thereafter. Germany has notified Holland that she can have a certain allotment of coal but if she wants more than that allotment she must send her own miners to get it.

PRISONERS IN MUTINY WASHINGTON PRISON

Walla Walla, Aug. 23—With only an occasional outbreak tonight the situation at the Washington state prison, where the convicts have been in a mutinous condition for several days, is much improved. Warden Dunn today segregated the leaders from the other convicts and the result was an almost immediate improvement.

All the convicts have been kept in their cells as a result of the trouble and the prison work has ceased.

The convicts broke nearly all the electric lights and window lights in two of the wings, using broken pieces of their tools as missiles.

LINER IS REPORTED SUNK BY SUBMARINE

Boston, Aug. 23—The Leyland liner Devonian has been sunk, according to a cable to the local office of the company, received today. The ship was westward bound from Liverpool to Boston.

Details of the sinking are lacking, but it is believed she was torpedoed by a German submarine.

The Devonian was carrying no passengers on this trip.

NEW YORK WELCOMES BELGIAN COMMISSION

New York, Aug. 23—New York paid its tribute to the Belgian war mission Tuesday. After a parade, Baron Monchuer and the delegates, including Belgian army officers, sailed on the police boat Patrol from One Hundred Thirtieth street to the Battery, where an immense crowd roared its greeting as they landed.

At the city hall Mayor Mitchell extended a formal welcome, the Seventh Regiment standing at attention while the commissioners passed.
