LOCAL SEED FARM

PROPOSAL MADE FOR

A letter received by the Chamber of Commerce and referred to its board and also the county agricultural council, is deserving of more than passing attention. It

"To start a seed farm growing a general line of garden seeds, also taking in the ornamental part and to grow a full line of nursery stock, also ornamentals, specializing on the government blight proof stock which Professor Reimer of the experimental station of Talent has work ed out. I am personally acquainted with him and his methods. In fact, I furnished over half of the trees for the first plant at that station.

"The seed business is one of the best things any community can have. This county of Twin Falls, Ida., grows over four millions of dollars worth annually of the larger varieties such as peas, beans, beets, the clovers and potato seeds. These are grown for the large seed firms in the east. I do not mean to go into it on such a large scale. Just grow a general line for the trade. such as all stores handle. Southern Oregon is better adapted to growing seeds and plants than this place, as the season is longer and the winters are too severe here.

"There are big profits to be made in seeds. Some of our largest seed firms have started on one acre of ground. If we could rent ten acres of good land that would do very well for a starter, but it must be so we can irrigate if we need it.

"It will take between ten and twelve hundred dollars to start and carry the business through the first year. This amount need not be paid in all at once. Of course, the more money we have, the better start we can make. I have had over 5 years experience in nursery and seed work. I will refer you to Professor Reimer of the experimental station as to my ability to take charge of inal, the Russian "slava," means gloria plant of this kind. 




