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GIVES GERMAN MINISTER LEAVE PAPERS

ARGENTINE HANDS PASSPORTS TO COUNT LUXBURG AS DIRECT HINT TO GERMANY

REOPENS SUBMARINE QUESTION

Germany Must Restate Submarine Position Which Must Be Satisfactory to South Americans

Buenos Aires, Sept. 12.—The Argentine foreign office today handed Count Luxburg, German charge d'affaires, his passports.

Buenos Aires, Sept. 12.—The action of the Argentine government has reopened the entire submarine controversy and hints at a breaking off of relations with the German nation.

Germany will be asked to re-state her submarine plans. If Argentine hold these to be satisfactory, Germany will be permitted to send another minister to Buenos Aires. Otherwise Argentine will withdraw her minister from Berlin.

BODY OF KLAMATH ENGINEER FOUND AFTER THREE WEEKS

Klamath Falls, Sept. 12.—News that the body of Horace Marshall, the engineer at the Klamath Agency, who was lost while hunting in the Red Bluff country three weeks ago, has been recovered here, and the report that he was shot through the mouth about five miles from Fort Klamath, where he was apparently headed, is bringing out discussion as to whether he shot himself, or met with foul play from some other source. Marshall had resided in the county for the past ten years, and had a host of friends. He was an engineer of considerable ability, having constructed the dam at the Klamath Agency. He was a veteran of the Spanish war, and had served more than ten years in the United States navy.

TROUBLE IN FORMING NEW FRENCH CABINET

Paris, Sept. 12.—M. Painleve has formally announced that he is unable to form a new cabinet and has requested President Poincaré to relieve him of that duty. The president, however, is urging him to continue his efforts, feeling that he is the most likely to gather a workable government around him.

MAINE TURNS DOWN SUFFRAGE FOR WOMEN

Portland, Maine, Sept. 12.—Maine will not join the states giving women the right to vote. In a special election held Monday throughout the state woman suffrage was overwhelmingly defeated. The estimated vote will give the suffragists about 25,000 against about 55,000 for their opponents.

SENATE VOTES DRAFT FOR FRIENDLY ALIENS

Washington, Sept. 12.—The senate this afternoon passed the Chamberlain resolution authorizing the conscription of friendly aliens. The resolution provides that all aliens of allied countries may be drafted unless treaties with their home governments exempt them. The soldiers' insurance bill is scheduled to pass the house late today.

CREDIT REPORT OF SEA FIGHT

New York Hears of Naval Battle in Which Americans Are Victors Hauling Submarine Base

New York, Sept. 12.—It is persistently reported here that the United States fleet of destroyers abroad have engaged in several battles. The New York Times prints a letter declaring that the American destroyers raided a German submarine base, sinking five submarines. Another destroyer is reported to have sunk the German warship Ulan. Many details are given of this engagement some of them bearing the evidence of being genuine.

FORMER WAR DEPARTMENT OFFICER NOW IN ARMY

Camp Lewis, American Lake, Wash., Sept. 12.—Major Henry Breckinridge, former assistant secretary of war, is one of the battalion commanders here. He quit President Wilson's cabinet because of a disagreement with Secretary of War Garrison over the question of preparedness.

"My uniform is my answer to whether I believe in this war," he said today.

GERMANS ENLARGE ON BRITISH LOSSES

British Headquarters in France, Sept. 12.—Seeking palliation for their losses around Lens, the German staff has sent a wireless message claiming British losses in the Lens sector to a number that is greater than the total number of British who are actually engaged there.

The German staff estimated the British dead, wounded and missing at 200,000; while the British staff asserts that it has reliable information to the effect that German losses were double those of the British.

POPE HAS HOPES FOR PEACE BEFORE END OF YEAR

Rome, Sept. 11.—The pope is optimistic in the hope of success of his negotiations for peace before Christmas. He has been quoted as saying that the war will end this year.

FRENCH DRIVE WEDGE INTO TEUTON POSITIONS

Paris, Sept. 12.—The French penetrated to the third German line of defenses in a brilliant raid upon St. Souplet. The official statement adds that the enemy's garrison was annihilated.

AVIATORS COLLIDE WHILE IN MID-AIR

San Diego, Sept. 12.—Edward Walsh of Oakland and Theodore Lyman of St. Helens, Cal., were killed today in the most sensational aviation accident in American history.

The aeroplanes, piloted by these two aviators, crashed together 400 feet above the earth. Both machines burst into flames and fell to the ground. Both men were found dead when removed from the wreckage. An investigation of the accident was immediately begun. It is believed that neither of the aviators saw the other approaching.

TEXAS COUNTY JOINS SPREADING DRY TERRITORY

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 12.—Dallas county, including Dallas, Texas' largest city, voted dry in yesterday's local option election by nearly 2,000 votes, according to returns early today.

TWO WARRING FACTIONS DIVIDE UNHAPPY RUSSIA

Several Army Divisions Following Korniloff In Attack Upon Petrograd and Kerensky Government While Many Sections of Country Support Premier

Petrograd, September 12.—Tsarko-selo, where the czar formerly spent much of his time, will probably be the scene of the first battle between the revolters and the provisional government's troops. General Korniloff's forces are rapidly nearing that city and reports of a clash are expected here any hour. The public's chief anxiety seems to be settled around the food situation. Petrograd's food supply has been severely depleted.

The provisional government late today issued a proclamation calling Korniloff, Denikin, Litkomsky, Markoff and Kislakoff, traitors to the Russian government and outlaws to be punished later. Martial law has been decreed for the Moscow district.

London, Sept. 12.—General Korniloff plans to place the head of the Dolgorouki family on the Russian throne, it is reported here today.

Moscow, Sept. 12.—The Moscow garrison has pledged absolute fidelity to the provisional government. The municipal council has issued a proclamation demanding that all the cities of Russia support the Kerensky government.

Petrograd, Sept. 12.—The provisional government has proclaimed a general state of martial law throughout Russia. Vice-Premier Nekrasoff announced that all generals in the army except those on the southwestern front have pledged full allegiance and loyalty to the government.

STORY TOLD OF GERMANY'S LIQUID FIRE BATTALION'S WATERLOO IN VERDUN FIGHT

With the French Armies, Aug. 10.—(By mail)—The story of how Germany's model battalion of "Strosstruppen" met its Waterloo at the hands of 40 dismounted French dragoons in the recent desperate fighting for the possession of Hill 304 at Verdun has just come to light.

This model battalion of "Strosstruppen" was commanded by no less a person than Captain Rohr, the inventor of "Strosstruppen" fighting. The 40 dragoons lost half their number, but they effected the complete destruction of two whole companies of "Strosstruppen" and after being driven backwards for 200 yards regained all the ground lost.

During the three weeks in which the crown prince prepared his assault of June 28 and 29 on Hill 304, French aviators succeeded in securing photographs of the precise spot back of the German lines where Captain Rohr's model battalion of "Strosstruppen" was undergoing its daily rehearsal for the attack.

It was at 6:30 in the evening that the 40 dragoons holding one of the most important advance posts before Hill 304 saw the "Strosstruppen" leap unexpectedly to the attack.

First of all at intervals of 20 paces came three crews of pioneers and liquid flame throwers. Following them, at mathematical intervals three crews of hand grenadiers; still farther behind a line of troops armed with trenching tools and rifles; then the occupation troops, whose duty it is to organize and hold the ground conquered by the "Strosstruppen" and finally the purveying troops bringing up grenades, munitions and sandbags for the fight.

The first onslaught of the "Strosstruppen" was quickly repulsed. One dragon named Ledue was buried by a torpedo clear to his hips. Twice two groups of four Germans each

Premier Kerensky is in hourly communication with his commissaries at the front who are instructed firmly to oppose the pro-Korniloff agitation among the soldiers and in particular, to prevent the infection spreading among regiments as are known to belong to the side of the government.

While the cabinet was debating the form the new government should assume the central executive committee of the all-Russian councils of deputies held an excited session, at which the determination to support the Kerensky government was unanimously expressed. Speeches were delivered in behalf of all the parties represented and resolutions as to necessary measures were passed.

Korniloff has declared that his revolt against Kerensky is animated by the highest patriotism, and by a desire to "save Russia from a government dominated by the German general staff."

It is declared that Korniloff's emissary, Vladimir Lvoff, is one of the organizers of the revolt. It is added that Korniloff is under his influence and in order to make a breach inevitable he exaggerated to Premier Kerensky, Korniloff's demands.

Lvoff is a striking personality. He spent 12 years as a member of the duma, championing reforms and is the organizer of the Moscow ecumenical congress. During his occupancy of the post of procurator of the Holy Synod he cleansed the country of Rasputin.

LOCAL CHAPTER WILL HELP UNIT

Hospital Corps of State University to Be Assisted by Grants Pass Red Cross Chapter

The directors of the local chapter, American Red Cross met this noon at the Chamber of Commerce rooms, in a resumption of the luncheon-business meeting series which were so successful last spring.

A thorough review of the chapter's financial situation was presented. There remains about \$2,500 of "War Drive" subscriptions yet unpaid. The directors earnestly requested persons making these subscriptions to pay the balances due as the funds are urgently needed.

The sum of \$250 was voted to aid in the formation and equipment of the University of Oregon hospital unit which is to be sent to France just as soon as supplies are furnished.

The matter of a bazaar or other entertainment for the raising of additional needed funds, was brought up and referred to the finance committee with power to act.

The further sum of \$250 was voted for supplies, mostly yard for the use of local women in knitting the 150 sets of knitted articles for which an urgent appeal was recently received.

The matter of Red Cross work by students at the high school was discussed and the policy of encouraging outside groups to organize auxiliaries to the chapter endorsed.

VILLA IS AGAIN UP TO OLD TIME TRICKS

El Paso, Texas, Sept. 12.—Led by Pancho Villa, a force of 200 bandits raided the outskirts of Parrai today, according to reports received here this afternoon.

Stores were looted and it was reported the bandits carried off a number of women.

NORTHWESTERN ATHLETES TO MEET AT SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 12.—The annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest Association of the Amateur Athletic union will be held here October 7, when plans for the coming season will be made. The meeting was originally scheduled for September 30 at Spokane.

GERMANY MAY ASK FOR SEPARATE PEACE

Rome, Sept. 12.—Germany and Austria may seek a separate peace with the United States.

Persons close to the vatican and in touch with information being brought to the Holy See, believe that the German government is speculating on how far the allies will be guided by the attitude of the United States. In this connection it is pointed out that the United States has never signed the London compact.

CRITICS DRAFT LAW EMBARRASS NATION

Washington, Sept. 12.—Critics of the selective draft law are placing the United States in an extremely perilous position,—the senate military committee was warned today.

The committee unanimously recommended the rejection of Senator Harwick's amendment, declaring the amendment would disorganize the army and leave the nation powerless, thus making the United States the world's laughing stock.

Senator Harwick's amendment would prevent the sending of conscript troops to Europe. Harwick promises a vigorous fight for his amendment.

LIFE PRISON TERM GIVEN RALPH TURPIN

MURDERER OF WILLIAM McCALLISTER GIVEN EXTREME LEGAL PENALTY

WILL BE TAKEN NORTH TONIGHT

Record Made in Bringing Justice Swiftly and Surely to Yonahai Murderer of Fellow Workman

Ralph Turpin, who was found guilty of murder in the second degree, late yesterday afternoon, was sentenced to life imprisonment in the state penitentiary at Salem.

Turpin took his sentence with the coolness which has characterized his conduct since his arrest three days after the crime. To Sheriff Lewis he said last night, "It doesn't seem possible that I am to spend the rest of my life in states prison. I can't realize it."

Sheriff Lewis will take Turpin to Salem on tonight's train.

The course of justice in this case, quite contrary to many cases under American court procedure, has been both swift and certain. The crime was committed August 10. In practically one month, the offender is behind prison bars for life.

BUTTE STRIKERS VOTE TO RETURN TO WORK

Anacosta, Mont., Sept. 12.—The smelter men's union of the Anacosta mill tonight agreed by an almost unanimous vote to accept the company's terms and that the men should return to work at once.

This action, it is believed, will mean a settlement of the strike that has tied up the Butte mines and the smelter here since August 24, closing of the smelter because of a walkout of many employees and a strike of street car men, and shut-down of the mines in Butte, which had been working with a reduced force for two months.

CHICAGO PHYSICIAN IS SHOT BY HIS EX-WIFE

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Dr. G. J. Eisenbrand, with offices at 1116 Republican building, was shot and killed early today, while in his office, by his wife, a beautiful woman from whom he had been separated for some time.

GERMAN AGENTS FALL INTO AMERICAN HANDS

San Diego, Sept. 12.—The Anvil, a so-called "slacker" ship, with alleged "slacker" German agents aboard, arrived at this port this morning in charge of United States authorities. An American warship seized the Anvil as the vessel was making for the west coast of Mexico. Secret service men believe that the Anvil has on board the agents who are responsible for the Mare Island explosion.

Another boat load of slackers are reported at sea with an American warship chasing the craft.

HAIG REPORTS THAT GERMANS REPULSED

London, Sept. 12.—General Haig reported the repulse of a formidable German attack this morning. The Teutons launched their offensive under cover of a violent barrage fire after considerable artillery preparation.
