AUTO REGISTRATION IN STATE AND COUNTY

Automobile owners will be interested in knowing how the various makes of cars range in popularity in Oregon. It must be remembered that the number of a certain kind of car sold in this state may depend upon the strength and energy of the selling organization, and also that several makes of cars have been unable to supply the demand. Furthermore, the most popular car in Oregon may be quite otherwise in other states.

Those cars of which there are more than 800 registered with the secretary of state, September 1, 1917, are as follows:

Ford, 16,143; Overland, 3,256; Buick, 3,053; Studebaker, 3,018; Maxwell, 2,160; Dodge, 2,131; Chevrolet, 1,744; Cadillac, 1,024; Reo, 986; Chalmers, 811.

The following statement shows how Josephine county's registration compared with the total of the state:
