SHASTA MINER TAKES OVER ASHLAND MINE

Gold Hill, Ore., Sept. 24.—(Special)—The Barron gold mine, an old-time producer of southern Oregon, which has been involved in an estate for a number of years—has been sold to Harvey J. Sallee, a prominent mine operator of Shasta county, Cal. The new owner has been negotiating with the former owners, the Byron N. White estate, and George W. Barron of Ashland since the year of the Seattle fair for its purchase. The property lies nine miles east of Ashland within two miles of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway. The vein is 16 feet wide, is a smelter proposition, rich in gold, also carries silver and antimony in

paying quantities. The main works on the mine consists of a 750-foot drift at a depth of 200 feet, with a winze extending 50 feet deeper. A car load of machinery and tools have arrived, and work has commenced with 25 men cleaning out the old works, with John Kemble superintendent. Sixty miners will be employed when the mine is operated. Much ore is ready for shipment, having been banked up by former management. The ore will be hauled to Mistletoe station, and shipped to the Shasta county smelter for reduction.

Names of places prominent in news converted into English by the New York Times.

Words from Eastern war area—Slavonic, Hungarian and German: Braunsberg—Brownsberg. Bucharest or Bukharest—Boo-kar-rest.

Cettinje—Tret-teen-yeh. Czech—Check. Dantzig or Danzig—Dan-sik. Durazzo—Door-rahdzo or doo-rah-so.

Dnieper—Neeper. Epirus—Ee-ber-rus. Herzegovina—Hert-tee-go-vee-nah.

Ivangorod—Ee-van-go-rod. Jaroslaw—Ya-ras-loy. Jassy or Yassy—Ya-see. Kallisz—Kar-lidz.

Note—Much confusion will be avoided if it is remembered that "ville" does not conform to the French rule for the pronunciation of "ill" followed by a vowel. It is always pronounced "veel" in a short, sharp manner; never "ee-yr" as in "ville" or "famille."

London, Sept. 3.—(By mail)—Bomb-proofs in office buildings are the latest in London.

Many of the largest office buildings are constructing "dugouts" like the American cyclone cellars to protect their employees during air raids.

test their employees during air raids. The usual dugout is a thick parapet of sand bags in the basement. On the ground floor above bags of sand are piled up three or four feet thick. At the first alarm the office forces are ordered to flee to the cellar, even if the building collapses the dugout would afford protection.

In one big office building arrangements are made in the basement for the entire force of 860 employees with special emergency exits to the bomb-proofs. Other buildings are shielding the elevator shafts to prevent bombs dropping into the basement and wrecking the structure.
