London, Oct. 4.—While British and French airmen continue their bombing operations against Germany's submarine base at Zebrugge and points of military importance behind the lines, the French aviators are keeping up their attack on German cities in reprisals for the shelling by German airmen of the town of Bar-le-Duc. More than 15,000 pounds of explosives are reported to have been dropped on numerous German settlements, among them the famous town of Baden, famed as a health resort.

**M'ADOO IS ENTOUR FOR LIBERTY BONDS**

Tacoma, Oct. 4.—Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo will fire the opening gun of the local Liberty bond campaign at Camp Lewis next Tuesday when he will address the officers and men of the 91st division on the parade grounds.

Madison, Wis., Oct. 4.—Speaking before the bankers of Madison last night Secretary McAdoo reviewed the effect of Germany's submarine campaign and how it has hampered American industry.

"On the material side of the disaster which would have followed submission to the war zone order of Germany, is most striking," declared Mr. McAdoo. "The Kaiser's order forbade our ships from carrying our people and our commerce to England, France and Italy. Our prosperity and our welfare as a people are inseparably connected with our right of free and unmolested intercourse with those nations."
