A SOLDIER'S COMMANDMENTS

Rules laid down for soldiers are often as applicable to those in civil life as to the man in uniform. Especially is this true in times of war, when every citizen in this great country should consider himself a soldier for the great common cause.

General W. E. French of the British army wrote what he called the "Ten Commandments for the Soldier" which he asked his men to consider. They are:

"Keep your eyes at the ready, your ears at full cock, and your mouth at the safety notch."

"Obey orders first; kick afterwards, if you have been wronged."

"Keep your accoutrements clean and in good order."

"Treat your animals kindly and fairly."

"Do not waste your ammunition, your gas, your food, your time, your opportunity."

"Tell the truth squarely; face the music and take your punishment like a man."

"Remember Edith Cavell, Belgium, Serbia, the Lusitania, Louvain and the U-boats."

"Be merciful to the women of your foe, and shame them not for you are a man, not a beast, and a woman bore you. And pity and shield the children in your captured territory, for only a dastard makes war on the weak."

"You shall kill in the name and for the sake of liberty, equality and fraternity, until right shall triumph over might and victory crown justice."

"You shall fight shoulder to shoulder with your brothers in the League of Liberty, to the end that despotism, autocracy and frightfulness shall perish upon the earth and that freedom and democracy shall become the heritage of mankind."

"Fear dishonor, dread defeat, be of good cheer and high courage and don't shirk work or danger. Fear not death, dread not wounds, suffer in silence and die game."

These sound rather military, do they not? But re-read them and see if they do not teem with injunctions which apply quite as well to civil life as to that on the field of battle. There are just as true, just as valuable soldiers in the cause of world freedom, in the quiet home towns of inland America, as many of those who go across the seas.

Fall Spraying

Now is the time to spray peach trees. While Blue Vitrol is high priced you cannot afford to pass up this spraying if you expect to get any fruit. You may get by sometimes, but you will surely get caught frequently.

A farmer told me not long ago that he had been treating his grain consistently for several years for smut, but one of his neighbors, who had not been doing so seemed to be as free from smut as himself, so he thought he would omit the treatments this season. The result was that both farmers had very heavy losses this year from smut.

This is also an ideal time to spray apples for anthracnose. For either of the above use the 5-5-50 formula. Slack the lime, make up to 25 gallons, then dissolve the blue vitrol and make up to 25 gallons in a separate container and then pour the two solutions together. Do not mix up more than you want for immediate use. It is of no value unless used fresh. Use heavy pressure and spray thoroughly.

AUSTRIANS REQUISITION CROPS OF CONQUERED SERBIA

London, Oct. 22.—Crops throughout Serbia and Bulgaria are better than ever before, according to information received by the Serbian government. In occupied portions of Serbia, however, all the harvests have been requisitioned by the Austrians, and not even enough has been left to enable the native farmers to exist until next summer. The farmers receive only a nominal price for the grain requisitioned by Austria, while no payment at all is made by the Bulgarians.

MEXICO MAY BREAK WITH GERMAN EMPIRE

Mexico City, Oct. 22.—Newspapers here devote much space to discussion of a possible break in this country's relations with Germany, following the recent secret session of the senate, when the question was debated. The Universal says a simple declaration of benevolent neutrality would not be sufficient because, according to statements of several senators and deputies, this would leave the existence of German propaganda, information bureaus and espionage.

The legislative bill proposed on the subject provides that a committee shall call on President Carranza and request him to make, officially, at least a solemn declaration of benevolent neutrality toward the entente allies, which expression is deemed necessary by the bills introduced for sustaining the government and re-establishment of universal peace and progress, as well as the life of the Mexican nation.

El Demokrata, a pro-German newspaper, says that Mexico, in breaking relations with Germany would be going to war for the sake of making money and would bind its liberty under the yoke of the United States.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT CONFISCATING LANDS

London, Sept. 22.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—During the past three years, the British government has gradually developed into a "land grabber" on a scale which exceeds all previous performances. Its total seizures and "purchases" of real estate, since the war began, aggregate more than 150,000 acres, divided among thousands of acres.

This has been quite a simple operation as for war purposes the government had behind it a comprehensive law called the "Defense of the Realm Act." This entitled the authorities to take over property of all kinds and convert it to their own use, leaving the question of compensation to be decided afterwards.
