Called East as Witnesses—District Attorney W. T. Miller, and John Denison, as ex-deputy sheriff, leave tonight for Kansas City as witnesses in the Ernest B. Dennison case, being tried there in the federal court. The present case is against Ernest B. Dennison Kirkwood and Hass, who are charged with bribing a postal employee. This case is an outcome of one tried here some years ago, being the State vs. Oslin M. Jackson, for embezzlement.

Conscientious Objectors—A train load of "conscientious objectors" passed through here this morning headed south. There were six coaches carrying about 250 men who are to be taken to San Diego and to a New Mexico camp, where they will be put to work at semi-peaceful pursuits. The train was entirely closed and guarded by armed officers.

Artist at Hall's—An interested crowd has gathered during the past few days at the window of Hall's Art store watching Prof. C. A. Lowe paint in oils, the pictures from start to finish, being completed in a comparatively short time. The professor is a skillful and rapid artist, but he is far above that class known as lightning artists, and while most of his pictures painted here are scenes from nature, he is equally good at animals. Mrs. Lowe is also a gifted artist and teaches the work.

Red Cross Moves—The headquarters of the Grants Pass Red Cross chapter has been moved from the Conklin building to the new court house, and until January will occupy the janitor's quarters in the basement at the northeast corner of the building. There are four rooms in the suite and they will be warm and comfortable for the meetings, the first one in the new quarters to be held tomorrow night. Later rooms will be provided on the second floor of the court house.

CULL APPLES SHIPPED TO WILLAMETTE VALLEY

Cull apples from the Rogue river valley fruit belt are being shipped to Eugene to be converted into cider vinegar at the cannery of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, the first car load having been received at the cannery yesterday, says the Eugene Register.

J. O. Holt, manager of the association arranged for shipping these apples to Eugene and it is expected that several carloads will be brought here.

The vinegar output of the Eugene plant is expected to be much larger this year than ever before. The management of the cannery announced early in the season that there would be a market for all cull apples grown in Lane county to be used for this purpose, but it appears that there are not enough here to supply the demand and outside fruit districts are being called upon to supply a large quantity of them.

The apples bought for making cider are those that are unsuitable to ship and are usually thrown away or fed to stock, but this year they will bring in thousands of dollars to the growers.

THREE CENT LETTER RATE NOVEMBER 2

Beginning November 2nd, the people of this country will lick a three cent stamp on their letters instead of the two cent stamp and in doing so will assist in licking Germany.

On that date the postal rate on all letters will be raised to three cents per ounce, except drop letters, which are those delivered direct from the local office. Postals and post cards will require two cents.

Article 339 of the postal laws reads as follows:

"Upon all matters of the first class postage shall be charged at the rate of three cents for each ounce or fraction thereof; and drop letters shall be mailed at the rate of two cents per ounce or fraction thereof, including delivery at letter carrier office. (Note—A drop letter is one addressed for delivery from the office at which it is posted) There is no drop rate on any matter except letters.

"It is of the utmost importance that every patron of the postal service become familiar with the increased rates of postage provided for letters postals and postcards.

"Failure to pay the proper amount of postage will delay the dispatch and delivery of mail, cause confusion annoyance and inconvenience and impose upon the postal service unnecessary labor and expense.

All parcels addressed to our soldier friends must not be over seven pounds in weight, bear the sender's name on the upper left hand corner and addressed to the American expeditionary forces, viz:

JOHN SMITH,
Co. X, Infantry,
Expeditionary Forces.

The department will know where Company X is and will deliver the package to John Smith of that company.

All parcels to be delivered by Christmas should be mailed not later than November 15th.

MONUMENT BASE AT TRUCKEE COMPLETED

Truckee, Cal., Oct. 26.—The base for the Donner Monument, which is to be erected at Donner Lake, has been completed. It is built of boulders set in concrete. The base has a height of 22 feet, so that the bronze statue crowning the top may always project above the deep winter snows. Nearby may yet be seen the stumps of trees cut by the trapped emigrants nearly 70 years ago.

The monument which will be dedicated in June with elaborate ceremonies, is to perpetuate the memory of a band of pioneers, including women and children, which, with a few exceptions perished when overtaken by a winter storm near the lake which bears its leader's name.
