CITY PASSES TAX BUDGET FOR YEAR

At the regular monthly meeting held last night the new budget of the city's taxation was passed upon. This year the rate of taxation is greater than that of last but the valuation of the city property was decreased, making little difference in the amount paid by the property owners.

Last year the valuation of city property was \$2,454,643, this year it was cut to \$2,401,900, being over \$52,000 less than before. On the other hand the rate last year was 16 mills and this year it is 20 mills. The levy is as follows: General tax levy, \$19,887.73. Special tax levy, \$18,494.63. Sinking fund, \$1,607.60.
