RUSSIA

The old habit of mankind, of turning against the man that is down, or temporarily suffering reverses, is seen again in the comments flooding the American, as well as the British and French press, regarding Russia's "fall-down." John R. Mott, the famed Y. M. C. A. leader, who was a member of America's recent mission to Russia and is well acquainted with condition in that disturbed country, strongly protests against belittling the new republic.

"It ill becomes the people of the United States to speak and write against Russia. The Russian people combine the graces that make for a great nation, splendid physique, intellectual capabilities, idealism and warm-heartedness. Then too there are real leaders among the Russians who, in time, are going to bring their people into a compact, efficient and free nation. I believe there are as many strong men among the Russians as among any people on earth.

"The principles of the Russian revolution are right. They are the same as those which brought the United States into being. They are the principles which brought us to the aid of the allied cause."

Mott admits the political unrest and turmoil, the industrial confusion, the possibilities of future revolutions before the country settles under a permanent dependable government. He knows the army is demoralized, but he insists the people are not.

Is it not natural that a nation which has buried 3,000,000 men and boys, more than the rest of the allies all together; that has had 2,000,000 more mutilated in battle, and about 2,500,000 now languishing in German prisons, should be tired of war? "Let the United States wait until its losses are half these before she reproves Russians with being cowards and quitters," says Mott.

The army has been betrayed time after time by trusted commanders. Why wonder that the rank and file are suspicious of the commands given them. They have seen 100,000 men go into battle and less than 10,000 return, not because they were poor soldiers, but because they were not supplied with ammunition. They have been held down to two or three shots per man per day, while under fire of approximately 4,000 shots from each of the enemy. Would not Americans grow weary of such warfare. German propagandists are spread stories of land distributions back in Russia in which they wish to share and feel that they cannot while at the front.

In spite of all this, the Russian

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army is one of the real bulwarks of the allied cause. Though unable to start a powerful offensive for the present, it is holding something over 150 divisions of the Teutonic forces that would otherwise be free to go to the Flanders front. If Russia can continue to hold those divisions and do nothing more, she will be the means of saving a million lives for the French, British and Italians. With help in materials, it is believed Russia will be able to do that.

GOVERNMENT NEEDS MORE STENOGRAPHERS

Washington, Nov. 6.—The United States civil service commission authorizes the following announcement:

Now that Uncle Sam has the young men of the country in training for military service, he finds that he needs 10,000 typewriter operators and stenographers and typewriters, both men and women, for the departments at Washington.

The civil service commission has notified all of its 3,000 boards of examiners that they should put forth their best efforts to secure these urgently needed workers. While examinations are now held weekly in 450 cities, the commission states that arrangements will be made to have an examination held at any accessible place where a small class of applicants can be secured. The entrance salaries range from \$1,000 to \$1,200 a year.

FRISCO HOTELS WILL OBSERVE HOOVER DAYS

San Francisco, Nov. 6.—San Francisco hotels, restaurants and cafeterias are observing their first "meatless Tuesday" today. Tomorrow they will observe "wheatless Wednesday." These "meatless Tuesdays" and "wheatless Wednesdays" will remain in effect until the emergency which demanded their establishment has passed.

The unanimous membership of the San Francisco Restaurant Men's Association has been pledged to strictly observe these days.

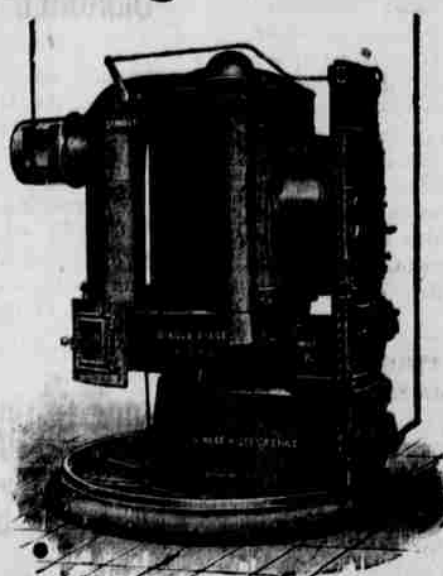
GERMANS TO ATTACK ART CITY OF VENICE

Amsterdam, Nov. 6.—Commenting on the Austro-German advance toward Venice, a semi-official Berlin news agency predicts an attack on that art center, contending that it is also an important center of war industry.

FINE FOR FRAUD IN FRUIT SCALE CURES

Washington, Nov. 6.—Claims that the insertion of a white capsule and a brown capsule, containing potassium cyanide and other substances, in the bark of fruit trees will kill scale on the trees, led to a fine of \$100 in the federal courts upon the makers of the "Fertilizing Scale Treatment," who pleaded guilty to the charge of misbranding the adulteration. This fine was imposed in the case of the United States versus Albert D. Kleckner, Mabelle B. Kleckner and Emma Kleckner, brought under the Insecticide Act of 1910 at the instance of the United States department of agriculture. The department tested these capsules for several years on fruit trees to determine whether their use had any deterrent effect on scale and whether the material also actually fertilized the trees as asserted by the makers. The department found that the capsules did not kill scale and did not fertilize the trees, but on the contrary, injured the tree.

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STATE FIRE MARSHAL REPORTS CONDITIONS IN GRANTS PASS

(Continued From Yesterday)

Recommendations

1. That City Ordinance No. 761 condemning buildings be strictly enforced.

2. That ordinance be enacted prohibiting the use or handling of gasoline in any place where the amount exceeds one quart unless contained in gasoline safety can.

3. That ordinance be enacted prohibiting the starting of fire in rear of buildings without first obtaining a permit from the fire chief.

4. That ordinance providing for the numbering of houses and placing street signs at all street crossings within the city of Grants Pass be strictly enforced.

5. That ordinance be enacted requiring that all chimneys now or hereafter to be built, must and shall be built from the ground up.

6. That two of the hose carts now at headquarters be housed on the north side of the track with at least 100 feet of serviceable hose on each cart, the location to be kept to the discretion of the fire chief. This would enable any of the volunteer firemen residing in the neighborhood to keep fire confined until arrival of department. It is also a safeguard for the surrounding property in case the fire apparatus should be out fighting fires in another part of the city.

7. That council enact ordinance requiring that all rubbish, garbage and waste matter be collected at least twice a week from the district inside of fire limits.

8. That council enact ordinance requiring that any person, persons, firm or corporation doing electrical work in the City of Grants Pass must pay a yearly license in advance of \$— per year and that any and all electrical work installed by said person, persons, firm or corporation will conform with the rules of the National Electrical Code.

9. An ordinance empowering and authorizing the chief of the fire department of the city of Grants Pass to inspect buildings and other structures, to order the correction of the conditions therein which he may find to tend toward endangering property and life by fire; to appoint deputy inspectors to make such inspection and punish disobedience of such orders.

The city of Grants Pass does ordain as follows:

Section 1. The chief of the fire department is hereby empowered and authorized to at any and all reasonable time enter upon and into any premises, building or structure, within the corporate limits of the city of Grants Pass for the purpose of examining and inspecting the same to ascertain the condition thereof. Also with regard to the present arrangement of deposit of any articles, materials, substances, goods, wares or merchandise which may have a tendency to create danger of or from fire in said premises, building or structure in case of fire said premises, building or structure, or to create danger in case of fire on or in the same, or personal injury to or loss of life of the occupants of or persons on or in said premises, building or structure; also with regard to the condition, size, arrangement and efficiency, building or structure.

Section 2. If he shall find on such inspection of such premises, building or structure any rubbish, debris, waste or inflammable or combustible materials and that the same is not so arranged or disposed as to afford reasonable safeguard against the dangers of fire, or if he shall find that the articles, materials, goods, wares and merchandise on or in said premises, building or structure are so arranged and disposed that the occupants thereof or persons rightfully on or in the same would not, because of such arrangement and disposition be afforded reasonable access to the exits of said premises, building or structure in case of fire, or if he shall find that by reason of such arrangement or disposition the members of the fire department would unnecessarily and unreasonably be interfered with in the exercise of their duties in and about such premises, building or structure in case of fire in the same, he may order in writing the removal of such rubbish, debris, waste or inflammable or combustible materials from said premises, building or structure in such manner as will remove such danger from fire.
