LEAGUE OF NATIONAL SAFETY IS LAUNCHED

London, Oct. 1.—(Correspondence of Associated Press)—England must husband her food supply if her people expect America to economize in food for their sakes, is to be the plea of a "League of National Safety" which soon will be launched from the headquarters of the director-general of national economy. Members of the league will be advised that the people of the United States cannot be expected to save food for the benefit of England unless they are convinced that the British people are in earnest in adhering to a food ration. "Visitors returning to America from here should have no reason to report anything approaching scenes of luxury or extravagance," is the warning issued to members of the league.

The members are urged to observe the following rules:

Fresh meat to be served only once a day. No second helpings. Roast meat to be avoided as much as possible; it is wasteful.

Bread with the mid-day meal only if specially asked for. One slice less a day to be eaten.

One "Potato day" a week, to be as nearly as possible a breadless day. No butter with bread and jam.

Never more than one egg per head at any meal.

No early morning cup of tea.

The open sugar bowl at table to be abolished.

The league will make a special appeal to those whose wages, or incomes have been increased by the war.

GERMANS SUPPLIED WITH MACHINE GUNS

French Front, October 7.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—German appreciation of the value of the machine gun in modern battles was apparent at the very beginning of hostilities in 1914 and the most recent developments in their infantry formations give testimony of ever-extending reliance on this weapon for the defense of the front line.

Each German infantry regiment will be provided with no fewer than 24 of these weapons, whose manipulators are formed into a separate company, and besides these each company is to be furnished with six light rapid fire guns, altogether making a formidable equipment. This is an enormous increase over the number provided at the beginning of the war, when each regiment of infantry of the active army and its reserve possessed only six of these guns.

guns, special companies have been formed with the title of "Machine-gewehr-scharf-schuetzungsbattalion - gen." These operate separately from the battalions of infantry in attacks. They are composed of groups of six machine guns each, and three of these groups as a rule work together. There are altogether over 200 of these groups and their number is rapidly increasing. They came first into action during the battle of the Somme and they were engaged also in the battles around Verdun.

All the efforts of the Germans to find an effective portable machine-gun or automatic rifle such as that possessed by the French and British troops appear to have been unsuccessful, and although such weapons have been brought into action on several occasions they have quickly disappeared.

Amsterdam, Nov. 8.—German newspapers announce that the army physicians have discovered a successful method of curing the nervous affliction so frequent among disabled soldiers, which causes a constant trembling of the whole or part of the body.

Dr. Ernst Bayer, head of the nerve hospital at Roderbirken, has outlined a method of electrical treatment, which, it is claimed, often effects a complete cure in a few days, and is almost invariably effective within a period of three weeks. The newspapers describe his method as follows:

"By the application of a gentle electric current which causes no pain whatever, good results have been obtained in a few minutes or at the longest two and a half hours. A course of treatment is required after this, which does not last more than two or three weeks, and in light cases is finished in a few days. New attacks may occur due to excitement or nerve strain, but are easily cured."

enterprise, the spirits of men have ever entered upon. We have, if we but observe a reasonable and practicable economy, abundance with which to supply the needs of those associated with us, as well as our own. A new light shines about us. The great duties of a day awaken a new and greater national spirit in us. We shall never again be divided or wonder what stuff we are made of.

"And while we render thanks for these things, let us pray Almighty God that in all humbleness of spirit we may look always to Him for guidance; that we may be kept constant in the spirit and purpose of service; that by His grace our minds may be directed and our hands strengthened; and that in His good time liberty and security and peace and the comradeship of common justice may be vouchsafed all the nations of the earth.

"Wherefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, the 29th day of November next, as the day of thanksgiving and prayer and invite the people throughout the land to cease upon that day from their ordinary occupations and in their several homes and places of worship to render thanks to God, the Great Ruler of Nations.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done in the District of Columbia this seventh day of November, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and seventeen and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and forty-second.

"No, it isn't. But unless his wife has a generous disposition it's a sign that he is always in hot water."—Birmingham Age-Herald.

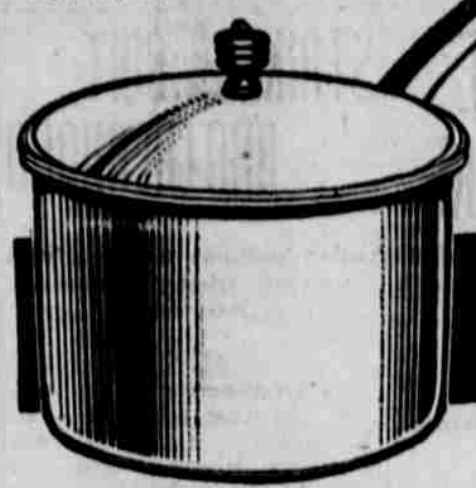
