SUGAR BEET CHECKS TOTAL LARGE SUMS

The sugar factor will, on November 15, mail out checks for the beets delivered during October, for a total amount of over \$40,000. On December 15, pay checks for the beets delivered during November, the period of the largest receipts, will be mailed out.

Sugar beet growers are doing a patriotic service in planting this product, according to the following statement of Herbert Hoover, food administrator:

"One of the most vital problems confronting this nation is that of procuring sufficient sugar to meet the requirements of our people and of the allied nations fighting our common battle. The production of cane sugar in this hemisphere can and will be increased to a limited degree. But we must rely upon the farmers in sugar beet producing sections of the country for a part of the needed supply. I, therefore, earnestly appeal to every farmer, so situated, to come to his country's aid in this hour of need. Without the co-operation of the American beet grower our task will be very difficult and our ability to respond to the calls to be made upon us for this very essential commodity will be curtailed. It is at least the duty of every beet grower to maintain in 1918 his normal acreage of sugar beets. It is his privilege to increase that acreage to the extent that a well balanced production of crops will permit, and in this manner effectively demonstrate his patriotism."

AGED PIONEER IS INJURED BY AUTO

John E. Weidman, an aged pioneer of Grants Pass, whose home is on East A and Eight streets, was struck by an automobile at about 9 o'clock this morning and seriously injured, and is now at the Good Samaritan hospital.

Mr. Weidman was returning to the city after completing some work on the south side of the river, and while walking across the bridge was overtaken by George Ferren, a farmer living on the Applegate river, who was driving a Ford. Ferren sounded his horn, but Mr. Weidman, being quite deaf, did not hear the alarm, and stepped in front of the machine. He was knocked down and pushed along for a few feet by the front wheels.

Mr. Weidman was taken to the hospital in the machine which struck him, and is now under the care of Dr. Loughridge, who says that two ribs are broken, and he fears internal injuries. His face is also cut and his body bears many bruises.

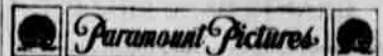
SOLDIERS RECEIVE MARKS FOR SERVICE

London, Nov. 13—British soldiers who have served in the great war will henceforth bear a distinctive mark of their service on their uniform. The war office announces that a chevron stripe will be immediately

issued to every soldier who serves overseas in a theatre of war. Soldiers whose service dates back to 1914 will be given a red chevron, and those whose service began after that year will get a blue stripe. An additional blue stripe will be awarded for each aggregate of 12 month's service. The new stripes will be worn by officers as well as privates.
