Fall Spraying of Fruit.

Fall spraying after the leaves of fruit trees have dropped may be substituted for the usual dormant spraying, and orchardists will thus overcome the difficulties in handling freight and obtaining labor in the spring. San Jose scale unless extremely limited can be controlled practically as well by fall operations as by deferring the work till spring, according to entomologists of the Ohio agricultural experiment station. Heavy sprays, made at much more easily limited over firm ground in the fall than over soft ground in the spring. Men and teams are more available for doing the work in fall than when the risk of spring work is on.

Amsterdam, Nov. 15.—The Russian legation at The Hague announces that it refuses to recognize the Maximist government in Petrograd.

Copenhagen, Nov. 15.—General Korniloff's troops have taken the Kremlin, the famous fortress at Moscow, after a severe fight, says the Beffingske Tidende's Petrograd correspondent.

Stockholm, Nov. 15.—An undated dispatch from Haparanda to the Dagens Nsheter says the commander of the bolshevik defenses in Petrograd issued a proclamation denying that the Petrograd troops had joined the Kerensky forces and declaring that the defenders of the capital were strong enough to resist forces double those of Kerensky.

TEACH "THREE R'S" IN TRAINING CAMP

No illiterates Will Go to the Front in Army Training in Kentucky.

There will be no illiterates in Camp Taylor when the order comes which will carry the 42,000 men to be trained near Kentucky's metropolises over the seas to France.

Two of the "three R's"—reading and writing—will be taught to every illiterate in camp. The order has gone out that no man who cannot read and write English shall go "over the top."

Prof. William H. Partridge has been placed at the head of the educational organization in the camp. He is organizing classes, which will be taught by officers and by intelligent enlisted men. Partridge is educational director of the Y. M. C. A. camp branch.

Books for the school are to be supplied by the Kentucky literacy commission. Many of the illiterate soldiers come from the hills of Kentucky, but a great many foreigners from Belgium and eastern France cannot speak and write English.

Many wealthy and intelligent men serving as privates in the drafted army are studying French. There are now nearly 20,000 men in camp, and the number will be doubled before cold winter sets in.
