RED CROSS NEEDS RAGS AND WORKERS

The Grants Pass chapter of the Red Cross society is voicing an urgent appeal for clean rags, which must be had for immediate shipment to France. The rags to be made into gun cleaners. If the boys are supplied they will not use their handkerchiefs for the work, hence the saving of material. There is also need for old table linen, sheets and cotton scraps for napkins, handkerchiefs, etc., old bed spreads for wash cloths, and all kinds of rags for fracture pillows. A dry load weekly will be most acceptable.

From 50 to 100 women are needed at the Red Cross rooms each work day. We are not doing our bit when we allow a faithful few to do it all. Show your patriotism by offering your services.

There are also a number of knitters in Grants Pass who should make their service felt in the great drive to provide comfortable warmth for the boys by working systematically in order that a steady output can be depended on for monthly or quarterly shipments; the lack of yarn has been a handicap, but now that a shipment has been received and more on the road there should be an exhibit worth while in a month's time. The need for wool garments is great.

JOSEPHINE COUNTY EXCEEDS QUOTA

Josephine county has exceeded its quota in the Y. M. C. A. drive by nearly 50 per cent.

As team after team made its report at the luncheon held this noon at the Chamber of Commerce, it was seen that the total required was to be exceeded by a material sum. These reports showed the following: Team No. 1, \$193.25; No. 2, \$112.55; No. 3, \$185.05; No. 4, \$277.00; No. 5, \$220.00; No. 6, \$234.00; No. 7, \$284.25; No. 8, \$284.50; No. 9, \$204.25; No. 10, \$171.60; high school, \$219.90; executive committee, \$411.25. Grand total, \$2,897.60.

Chairman Cramer announced that he was planning to send a check for \$2,000, the county's quota, to state headquarters tonight, and asking whether it would not be satisfactory for the local committee to retain the balance to apply on the county's quota for the next Y. M. C. A. drive.

New York, No. 15.—The grand total of contributions in the campaign of the Young Men's Christian association to raise \$35,000,000 for the war work fund was \$11,426,562, yesterday, according to announcement from headquarters. The central department, with headquarters at Chicago, leads the country with a total of \$4,952,685, and the eastern department, with headquarters in this city, is second with a total of \$4,151,561. The totals for the departments are:

Boston, \$1,256,230; western, San Francisco, \$459,000; southwestern, Dallas, \$358,900; southeastern, Atlanta, \$250,528.

Firemen Wanted for Navy—Postmaster W. P. Quilman received instructions this morning that Assistant Sergeant J. S. Sauerman of the U. S. navy will visit as many postmasters in western Oregon as possible between November 15 and December 15, for the purpose of enlisting 340 firemen for the navy. In view of the fact that after men are drafted they cannot be enlisted in the navy, every eligible man preferring the navy is urged to enlist at once. The maximum age has been advanced from 25 to 30 years, making age limits from 18 to 30 years.
