LIBRARY BOOKS READY FOR RURAL SCHOOLS

County School Superintendent Alice Bacon, a short time ago, received a shipment of nearly 600 library books for the schools of Josephine county, their purchase price amounting to nearly \$450. Their purchase is provided for in the Oregon school law, which requires a levy of 10 cents for each pupil between the ages of 4 and 20 years.

In this shipment are about 200 books for the Hugo high school which is paid for by that district, the expense being \$182.05. This selected library is the last requirement for placing the Hugo school in the class of standard four-year high schools.

School district representatives may secure the books for their district from the county superintendent at any time by calling at her office.

NEW STATE LEADER ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE

Portland, Nov. 15.—The annual meeting of the board of trustees of the Oregon anti-saloon league, was held at the Y. M. C. A. Portland, Ore., on November 13th. At this meeting Acting Superintendent E. A. Baker made his report and the following officers were elected: President, E. A. Baker, vice president, J. J. Ross, secretary, Rev. A. C. Moses, and treasurer, E. Quackenbush.

The new superintendent, Edwin Rawden, was present. Mr. Rawden came to the Oregon league from Lansing, Mich. For four years he was attorney for the Michigan Anti-Saloon league, and took an active part in the campaign that resulted in Michigan going dry last fall. After the election, he drafted and secured the passage of the law to make the constitutional amendment effective. He has had considerable experience in law enforcement work and for four years was prosecuting attorney in one of the counties of Michigan.
