### RED CROSS URGES NEED OF KNITTING

Portland, Nov. 17.—Close on the heels of the statement by Secretary Daniels that the sweaters knitted by the American women did the men in military service about as much good as an extra dress does a school girl, came the following telegram from the headquarters of the American Red Cross in Washington:

"We are unable to meet all of the demands made upon us by the officers and men at camps and cantonments for sweaters and other knitted goods. We are wiring tonight all our division officers urging them to increase the production of these sweaters to meet this necessity. We have purchased 500,000 sweaters in the open market in addition to those being made by members of our chapters. Our French commission is calling for 1,000,000 sweaters, but we are unable to supply them on account of the needs of our boys at home."

During the first half both teams played decidedly ragged ball. The local boys made two touchdowns and Medford failed to score. This statement means that Medford was a little worse than Grants Pass.

In the second half, the Grants Pass team pulled themselves together somewhat and ran up 25 points. Coach Blanchard expressed himself, after the game, as not at all satisfied with the showing made, attributing the fact that his boys felt sure they had an easy victory and did not exert themselves. The team played about evenly, with little to distinguish one player above his team-mates. Probably the most effective work was done by Capt. Wm. Bearss, Sherman Smith, Geo. Booth and Lee Wilson.

The boys gathered at "Rose's" for the usual celebration and post-mortems, at which their hostess had the usual greeting, "What will it be boys."
