### JAPAN'S RICE CROP IS MUCH LARGER THAN USUAL

Tokio, Nov. 20.—The department of agriculture and commerce forecasts the rice crop at 55,000,000 bales (koku), showing an increase of 1,000,000 bales over last year, or 6,000,000 over the average year.

In Korea the crop is estimated at 12,333,153 bales, showing a falling off of 297,856 bales due to the drought of last winter and spring.
