GROUND SQUIRRELS CAUSE LARGE LOSS

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 20.—A state wide campaign next spring to eradicate the ground squirrel, which it is estimated, has cost the agricultural and horticultural interests of the state approximately \$30,000,000 in crop and plant losses this year, has been planned by George H. Hecks, state horticultural commissioner.

The campaign will be opened as soon as the fields begin turning green in the spring time and will be continued until there is reasonable assurance that the number of ground squirrels in the state has been reduced to a minimum.

ENGLISH CHESTNUTS ARE VALUABLE CROP

London, Nov. 20.—The British school boys' horse-chestnut harvest is one of the amazing war activities of this autumn. Some time ago, an appeal was issued to the school boys stating that the government could use unlimited quantities of horse chestnuts and acorns in the manufacture of munitions. The quantities that have been turned in have exceeded all expectations, and the harvest is only about half in. One small London school has collected 24,000 pounds. A record is kept of the number of nuts collected by each boy, and the best record so far is 21,175. One school room of 20 boys has gathered 115,700.
