UNCLE SAM HELPING WITH ROAD BUILDING

San Francisco, Nov. 29.—The United States government is directing the \$20,000,000 worth of road work being done in California this year to a large extent. The old systems whereby roads are being built to satisfy certain political clientele rather than the people at large are disappearing under the directing genius of the United States office of public roads and rural engineering. This \$20,000,000 is distinct from the state's recent bond issue of \$15,000,000 for new roads.

At present the government is advising all boards of supervisors that its road building services are at the service of the various counties without any cost whatsoever. The office of public roads will send to any county requesting such aid a corps of civil engineers and all other necessary experts and will pay their board, lodgings and all other expenses while they are engaged in such work. All the county has to do is pay for the material and labor.
