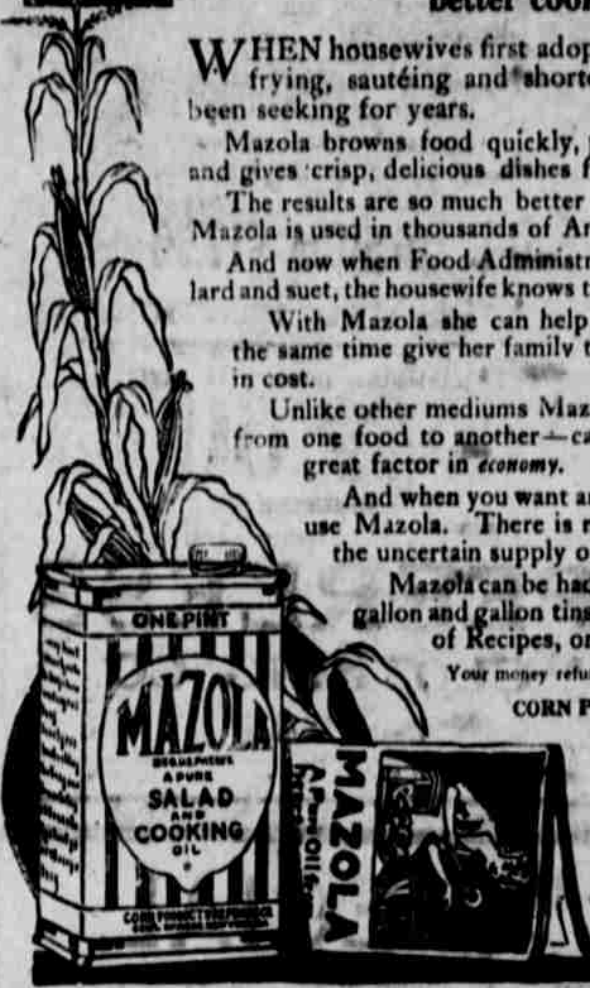

### GOLDFISH MARKET OF JAPAN

Koriyama and Tokyo Are Leading Centers of Industry From Which Good Returns Are Gained.

Koriyama is known throughout Japan as the great gold-fish market, the city of Tokyo ranking next in importance, says a correspondent. The waters around the former city seem particularly suitable for the culture of the many kinds of gold fish.

Generally speaking the gold fish lay eggs in April, the eggs being hatched in four or five days. No food is given the younglings for three days, but they are then fed finely ground yolks of eggs mixed with water, the yolks being first boiled then strained through silk cloth. This diet is later changed to the larvae of mosquitoes.

The most valuable fish is called the "Lion Head," which gets its name from the crests or horns thus that have the appearance of a lion's mane. Three-year-old fish of this variety command prices ranging from \$5 to \$26.

It is the usual custom to keep the fish in glass boxes although the fish cannot fully develop under such circumstances. Flat boxes made of wood free from lye or shallow cement ponds are considered ideal for keeping the fish.

### GERMAN NAMES ARE BEING CHANGED FAST

San Francisco, Dec. 11.—A lot of name changing, for which cupid is not responsible, is now going on in this city. Various persons having cognomens with an enemy alien suggestion, are asking the courts if they might switch to "Lee," "Smith" and various other names having a distinctly American flavor.

Before the war the courts here were asked to change but two or so names a year. Now they are being asked to change that many a day.

### SCIENTIFIC PARTY GO TO WEST INDIES

Iowa City, Ia., Dec. 11.—Professor C. C. Nutting of the state university here, who will lead an expedition of Iowa scientists to the West Indies next summer has received word that the English government buildings on the Pelican islands, which will be the base of the expedition will be turned over to the explorers without cost.

### WILL RE-EDUCATE MAIMED SOLDIERS

Iowa City, Ia., Dec. 11.—The state university here, has already begun to equip itself for the work of reeducation of the soldiers maimed in the great war. W. A. Jessup, president of the university, has appointed a committee to investigate the different channels whereby the university may participate in this service.

### CAVALRY DIVISION BEING ORGANIZED

Washington, Dec. 10.—A division of regular cavalry, the first the American army has had since civil war days, is being formed at El Paso, Texas. Officials said the step was in preparation for eventualities, and had no bearing on the Mexican border situation.

The project is part of the regular plan of the department, it is understood for the tactical organization of the expended regular army.
