Washington, Dec. 13.—The United States Guards will be the name of 25,000 auxiliary troops to supplement the state forces guarding war supplies and for general police duty. The government will want volunteers between the ages of 31 and 45.

AMERICAN CORN IN MEXICO HIGH PRICED

Mexico City, Dec. 13.—The city council has announced the sale of corn imported from the United States at .21 centavos a kilogram, or about five cents American money a pound. The corn will be sold under the supervision of the city council and only four kilograms will be sold daily to each person. In this way no one party will be able to acquire a large amount for speculative purposes.

EXPERTS STUDYING WAR'S EFFECT UPON CHILDREN

London, Nov. 25.—(Correspondence)—The war's effect upon the children of the belligerent countries is now being studied on this side by Miss Fannellebelle Curtis, director of Kindergartens of New York City and Mary Moore Orr, identified with various educational associations of New York City. These two women were sent to France and England by the committee of the conservation of the Children of America during the war.

OFFICERS FARE BETTER THAN DO THE PRIVATES

Paris, Dec. 13.—Slices of bread found on board the Zeppelin brought down at Bourbonne-les-Bains were shown at a meeting of the Academy of Agriculture. Some were grey in color, and covered with lard, these were for the men on board. The officers had bread much whiter and honey to spread on it. The officers' bread contained ten per cent of Java rice which, it was stated, must have reached Germany through Holland.

WOMEN OF UNIVERSITY MAKING MONSTER FLAG

Eugene, Ore., Dec. 13.—Women of the University of Oregon are at work on what probably will be one of the greatest "service" flags in the west. It will carry between 350 and 400 stars, each representing a former student now in the armed forces of the United States.

POTATO GRADING IS URGED BY EXPERTS

Salem, Dec. 13.—George Hyslop, professor in the department of farm crops at the Oregon Agricultural college, in a letter to the Oregon public-service commission, has asked that a hearing be set for the establishment of potato grading in this state. He suggested that the federal grades would serve well for Oregon and called the attention of the commission to the fact that potatoes are shipped from Oregon to California on a declining market and because of poor grading often arrive there in poor condition, with the result that they are sold at a loss.

STUDY INSECT WHICH INJURES SUGAR BEET

Sacramento, Dec. 13.—The work of an imported parasite used in Australia to exterminate the sugar beet leaf hopper, which is reported to have caused considerable damage in the beet fields of the Antipodes and which has invaded the fields of California, will be observed by E. J. Vosler, an expert entomologist of the state insectary here. The insect cannot be eradicated by spraying because of its hopping proclivities, experts said. It does its damage principally by stabbing the beet and inoculating it with a fungus or bacterial disease.


