Where Cyclones Originate. The most violent cyclones originate in tropical latitudes, in the Atlantic ocean to the north and east of West Indian Islands, and in the Pacific, in the China sea and in the neighborhood

of the Philippine islands The reason they are so destructive because they are carried such great distances by extraneous influences. The West Indian cyclones are attracted toward the Gulf stream by the great volume of heated air which always hangs over it and follows its course; so the cyclones of the Pacific follow the course of Kuro Siwo, the great urse of Kuro Siwo, the great ceanle current which passes arous the East Indian archipelago, the shores of China and the Japanese islands.

Cyclones may be anywhere from 50 to 500 miles in diameter and may travel over a path 5,000 miles in ex-

It was in Stuttgart that Dalmier evolved the internal combustion engine which a French man, with an eye to utility, quickly turned to account in the first practical motor car, says the Christian Science Monitor.
