London, Dec. 21.—Portuguese troops near Laventie, north of Arras, last night repulsed an attempted German raid, according to an official statement issued today from British headquarters in France and Belgium. The German artillery was active in the Ypres section.

GALLOWAY EXPLAINS TAX LIMITATION LAW
