**NICOLAI LENINE**  
Lenine, a leader of the Bolsheviks and one of the heads of the present government in Russia, gives strong praise to President Wilson's late statement of war aims. He ordered that the speech be wired at once to Trotsky, foreign minister of the Bolshevik regime, then attending the peace conference with the German delegates.

This is an unexpected turn. We are finding out that nobody knows much about internal Russia. The disappointment of yesterday is encouragement tomorrow.

Perhaps Lenine's own paradoxical character is part explanation. He is a strange figure. His name is not Lenine. His real name is Nicolai Ivitch Ulvanov. He is not a workman or a peasant. He belongs by birth to the Russian landowning nobility.

He is not a crude product of the oppressed masses of Russia. He is an intricate thinker, the author of several books, and a leader of the Bolshevik party since its birth in 1903. An authoritative writer says Lenine lives "in an imaginary world in which he mistakes the creations of his mind for realities." The same writer described him as a theorist and academician of great intellectuality.

He harbors for the masses a peculiar distrust. Though advocating rule by the people, he does not believe they can find their own way in the maze of modern social life. He maintains that they must be guided and for that reason he favors a strong central government.—Oregon Journal.

German spies seem to be industriously plying their profession of exploding bombs where they will kill and injure the most non-combatants, but, Uncle Sam seems to be holding them fairly under control. They are a mangy set of creatures and it stands every, loyal citizen in hand to be everlastingly diligent in

**FORMER GRANTS PASS MAN DIES AT ROSEBURG**

Word has been received of the death of J. C. Campbell at Roseburg, this morning. Mr. Campbell was one of the pioneers of this city, having resided here from the early '60s until about seven years ago, when he moved to Roseburg to be with his daughter, Mrs. J. H. Booth. He was engaged in active business life during the early days of the city, and was the first president of the First National bank of southern Oregon. He was continuously a director of the bank during its 28 years of existence. Mr. Campbell has been a member of Grants Pass lodge, No. 84, A. F. & A. M. since 1884. Interment to be tomorrow afternoon at Roseburg.

**HEAVY INVESTOR IN JOSEPHINE MINES DEAD**

The Washington Post of January 8, publishes an item regarding the death of Oscar A. Turner, who was heavily interested in Josephine county mining property, having bought the Waldo properties in 1910, and invested a total of more than \$100,000, which was checked through the First National bank of southern Oregon.
