An officer from San Francisco will repeat the process a week later.

Eugene, Jan. 17.—"The labor conditions in Coos Bay are excellent," stated L. A. Nelson of the United States forestry service, of Portland, on his return here from a trip in the interests of spruce production.

"In nine logging camps of the Smith-Powers Logging company every logger is a member of the Loyal Legion," declared Mr. Nelson. "Captain W. A. Arnold has done



wonderful work in awakening them to the necessity of getting out the spruce. The timber is there, we will furnish the equipment and the loggers will get out the stuff."

While finding some unexpected problems to be solved, Mr. Nelson was much pleased with the result of his trip and declared that he had met the heartiest response. He said that a few timber owners are inclined to want exorbitant prices, but that the operators had been instructed to go ahead and cut the timber and Uncle Sam would do the rest.

MEATLESS DAYS ARE NOW PORKLESS DAYS

"Meatless" days and meals in Oregon, until March 13, need be only "porkless," but there must be two "porkless" days per week and at least one "porkless" meal each day.

This announcement was made a few days ago by Federal Food Administrator W. B. Ayer, by direct order of U. S. Food Administrator Herbert C. Hoover, who telegraphed that this regulation would apply throughout Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California, Nevada and Arizona until March 13, on account of the accumulation in those states of cattle and sheep meat which cannot be moved eastward until after that date because of traffic congestion.

"Following out its policy of making no unnecessary restrictions or causing any unfavorable hardship, the food administration has removed all restrictions on beef, veal, mutton and lamb until March 13," said Mr. Ayer, "after which date the former regulations will probably be in force again. But as hog products are most needed at the front, special restrictions have been put upon pork, and the administration wishes those regulations strictly observed. Ham, bacon and salt pork, for obvious reasons, are the best and most convenient meats for the use of the armies, and for that reason we must conserve hog products especially on Tuesdays and Saturdays are the official porkless days, and we are asked to observe at least one porkless meal a day. Patriotic people who want to do all they can to help the food administration in its important work will be able to do much better than this, particularly since all restrictions have been removed from the other meats until March 13."

ANNEXATION IN WEST BUT NOT IN RUSSIA

London, Jan. 17.—German newspapers, as quoted in an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam, says that as a result of conferences an understanding has been reached between the political and military parties in Germany in order to avoid further friction. The Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin says the basis of the agreement is that Chancellor von Hertling's viewpoint in regard to eastern questions (acquiescence in the Russian program of no annexations or indemnities and the right of self-determination of peoples) is to prevail, whereas, Field Marshal von Hindenburg will have full liberty in the west in case of a German victory to deal with any possible annexations there.

TRANSPORTATION LINES ARE OPEN

Chicago, Jan. 17.—Transportation on the trunk lines out of Chicago virtually has recovered from the effects of the storm and by tomorrow all railroads will be running the regular number of trains, railway officials announced here.

All trains east are running practically on schedule.

The Rock Island and Burlington trains west are running virtually on schedules with indications that there will be no more immediate trouble, the traffic departments announced.

The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul and the Chicago & Northwestern also announced they were running their regular number of trains, and that there were few delays.
