KNOCK-DOWN HOUSES ARE SENT TO FRANCE

Washington, Jan. 19.—Portable houses built in America will shelter Yankee soldiers in the French war zone. These houses will be built in panels and shipped across the ocean in knocked-down condition and bolted together over there. To build them will require 300,000,000 feet of southern pine, a quantity half as great as that used in en-

campment construction in this country. Plans drawn by war department architects have been placed in the hands of lumber manufacturers and the work of filling this immense order is well under way, says American Forestry Magazine of Washington. At Fort Sheridan, in preparation for the officers training camp, 86 buildings were erected in 10 days. At Fort Oglethorpe 135 buildings were put up in 12 days. Without highly organized efficiency in the lumber and building industries these records would have been impossible.

AN EMBASSY ATTACHE DENIES HUNS HUNGER

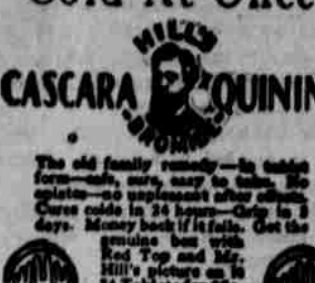
New York, Jan. 18.—While the people of Germany are living under a rationing system which provides much less food than was obtainable before the war, conditions in that country do not in the least approach a famine, according to Miss Lillian Goldman of this city, formerly connected with the American embassy in Berlin, who left the German capital about two months ago. After the United States went into the war, Miss Goldman entered the service of the Dutch embassy in Berlin and remained there until she left Germany.

Although Germany is not starving, Miss Goldman said, three and a half years of war have created a shortage in necessities that is felt throughout the empire and officials have averted calamity only by establishing drastic conservation measures.

"The people of Germany," she said, "are weary of war, but they believe a continuation of the struggle is necessary. I do not think the people as a whole are against their government. I think they regard it as necessary to their own life."

Germany did not realize the true character of America before this country entered the war, Miss Gold-

man said. The declaration of war was a surprise, she added, to a people who had convinced themselves that America would not fight. "I am sure," she added, "that when the German people come to understand the determination of America and her allies, a profound impression will be created which may lead them to demand an end to the war."

**TROTZKY WAS ONCE
ARRESTED IN SPAIN**

Madrid, Jan. 19.—The Spanish newspapers have just discovered that Leon Trotsky, the Russian Bolshevik leader, was under arrest in Spain for a short time in 1916. He reached Spain from France in October of that year but the police, having learned that he was a "dangerous anarchist," arrested him at Vigo, took him to Madrid and lodged him at the Central prison from November 4 to 13 pending investigation. Subsequently, he was released, but was requested to leave the country. He then embarked at Barcelona for the United States.

GOVERNMENT WILL HOUSE SHIPWORKERS AND FAMILIES

Washington, Jan. 19.—Without a roll call the senate this afternoon passed the bill authorizing expenditure of \$50,000,000 for the housing of workmen and their families at shipbuilding centers. The bill authorizing the president to declare military zones about the shipyards to prevent interference with the shipping program was also passed.
